Part II. DESCRIPTION OF CURRICULUM CHANGE

1. Catalog Description:

Department of French

Renée Liscinsky, Chair; Henry, Hurt, Jones, McCreary, op de Beeck; and professor emeritus Fisel

The Department of French offers a varied curriculum designed to provide not only basic language instruction but also the more advanced competencies needed by language specialists and students hoping to take advantage of an international study experience.

For the French major, the department has three degree programs: the B.A. in French, the B.A. in French for International Trade, and the B.S. in French Education (K-12). The degree program in French for International Trade provides the solid undergraduate training preparatory to an M.B.A. in International Marketing and Finance.

Students majoring in French will acquire proficiency in all phases of language and enter more deeply into the history, culture, and literature of Francophone countries. They will also gain knowledge of the linguistic development of the language throughout the centuries. French majors generally find employment in government work, librarianship, journalism, foreign trade, airlines, tourism, business and teaching. Students choosing careers as teachers will find the close supervision and advanced methodology offered by the department a distinct asset.

College Language Requirements

Students in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences and in most departments of the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics must pass the intermediate sequence of a foreign language (in French, FR201-FR202 or FR203) or demonstrate that they have somehow acquired the equivalent proficiency level. Students from the other colleges may choose to take French (FR201 and FR202 or the accelerated FR203) to fulfill a Liberal Studies elective. Any student who chooses French has an option to enroll in the traditional three-credits-per-semester courses or the accelerated six-credit track.

Placement/Exemption

The student with no previous French study will take FR101 (four credits) as a prerequisite. Students with previous French study will be placed into the appropriate course level by means of a written departmental exam administered in the summer for entering freshmen and during the first week of the semester for other students. No student judged to be a native speaker of French will be allowed to enroll in any course below the 300 level, with the exception of FR254.

Study Abroad -- Nancy, France

IUP has established a study abroad center in Nancy, France. All majors are encouraged to participate in the Study Abroad Program, especially those seeking the International Trade degree. Students have an option to participate in a full-year or one-semester (spring) program. A six-week summer session has also been added to the options available. Nonmajors may be accepted into any of the programs and, unless they have advanced proficiency, must enter the language courses offered in the *Cours pour étrangers* (Courses for Foreign Students). All foreign program credits are evaluated by the department as transfer credits. For further information about cost and application procedures, contact the French Department.

Internships

The Department of French, through contacts with certain French companies and through its affiliation with the ICN (*Institut Commercial de Nancy*), is able to place interns in Paris and other sites in France. The internship (generally six to twelve credits) is viewed as a highly desirable culminating experience following study in Nancy. For further information, contact the French Department at least six months in advance.

3. Rationale for change:

Rationale for restructuring the B.S. in French Education

For the Bachelor of Science in French Education major, the restructuring will offer greater concision and flexibility. Since the major requires many education courses and school-based experiences beyond the courses in French, the breaking up of the old FR351-352 and FR361-362 sequences will allow students to select the French courses with greater flexibility at the opportune time. Even this potential compacting of French courses offered at IUP (as opposed to Nancy) into three years will probably not afford the education major enough time for a full year's study abroad. However, a minimum of one semester of study abroad is expected.

• Rationale for deleting FR201 College French I as a requirement for the major

We expect students majoring in French to have enough preparation to be placed into FR202 College French II. The removal of FR201 from major requirements allows for the addition of three FR credits at a higher level, without changing the semester-hour total for the major.

• Rationale for restructuring the grammar courses

Currently French grammar is taught in a six-hour sequence normally taken during the sophomore year (FR351-FR352). Graduates have expressed the need for a refresher course in either the junior or senior year, and especially prior to student teaching. To that end the committee is proposing two separate courses: FR351 French Grammar (3 credits), which can be taken in either the freshman or sophomore year, and FR451 Advanced French Grammar (3 credits) to be taken during the junior or senior year.

• Rationale for restructuring the conversation courses

Presently a French major must enroll in six credit hours of French conversation: FR221 Conversation III (2 credits); FR222 Conversation IV (2 credits); FR321 Advanced Conversation I (1 credit); FR322 Advanced Conversation II (1 credit). Usually a French major takes the Intermediate Conversation sequence in the freshman year before having adequately mastered all the structures and before having acquired sufficient vocabulary to carry out conversation. The advanced conversation courses are highly unstructured (since they can be repeated for credit) and although students meet for two hours/week, only one credit is awarded. The proposed revision includes two three-credit conversation courses: FR321 Intermediate French Conversation (3 credits) and FR421 Advanced French Conversation (3 credits). The former will be taken after completion of FR202 College French II. FR421 will become a more structured course with specific objectives and prerequisites and allow for more sophisticated discussions in the target language.

Rationale for restructuring the culture/literature courses

Students now go into a survey of culture and literature when they are really not prepared for these courses. Our current curriculum requires a six-hour sequence (FR361-362) which combines culture with a survey of literature from medieval through the twentieth century. We propose that

the culture and literary content be taught separately rather than in one course. We also propose an Introduction to French Literature (FR361) which will be a well-structured introduction to all genres, literary movements and terminology. The catalog now lists a number of literature courses, such as FR367 Nineteenth-Century French Literature, etc. Since more and more of our majors are spending either a semester or year abroad, students graduate without completing the full cycle of literary periods. We propose to eliminate all existing literature courses and replace them with those listed above. (See Part II 2b, under "New Courses," especially new courses FR361 Introduction to French Literature, FR365 French Literature from Medieval through 17th Century, FR366 French Literature from 18th through 20th Century, and FR461 Studies in French Literature.) The current requirement of FR361-362 Development of French Culture and Literature I & II is to be replaced with a new requirement of FR361 Introduction to French Literature and FR363 French Civilization. The current controlled electives of FR363, 365, 366, 367, 368, 371 and 372 (i.e., all existing literature courses) are to be replaced with the new courses FR365 and 366, both required for the B.A. in French, one required for the B.A. in French for International Trade and one included as a controlled elective for the B.S. in Education.

Part III. IMPLEMENTATION

- 1. As explained in the rationale sections, these program changes reduce the number of elective courses and rearrange the chronology of some major requirements. Most of the course content previously offered has been reintroduced under new course numbers and syllabi into the new, streamlined programs. Thus students who are in the program will still be able to complete the requirements of the old program by taking departmentally approved substitutes for the courses formerly required. The department will NOT be able to offer parallel programs for students in BOTH the former and revised major programs.
- 2. These revisions offer a more rational system of meeting standard French major program objectives. While objectives have not changed in the aggregate, they are met with fewer course offerings, many of which were rarely if ever actually taught. Thus, no additional faculty needs are foreseen as a result of these revisions.
- 3. Other resource requirements will not change.
- 4. We believe that our programs will continue to attract a modest but stable number of majors. Since these revisions offer a more rational integration of our foreign study and internship programs into our majors, the excellent opportunity to study and gain experience abroad should appeal to larger numbers of talented and serious students. No unmanageable increase is anticipated.
