3 lecture hours

This course is a study of Spanish American poetry from it early manifestations through modernism, post-modernism and avant-garde.

The final grade for the course will be determined as follows:

- Tests. Two tests (mid-term and final) consisting of multiple choice, completion, true-false, and short essay. 100 points each.
- Class presentations/class participation. Each student will be expected to express and to defend opinions regarding Hispanic poetry and other material introduced in class. Each student or group of students will give an oral presentation on a literary work from the class discussions or work assigned by the instructor.
- Research paper. Each student will prepare a 5 page paper on a topic approved by the instructor. A preliminary draft of the paper will be due at midterm and the final paper will de due during finals' week. Research papers will be graded on content, mechanics, control of the Spanish language, and organization.
- 10% Quizzes. Periodic unannounced quizzes will be given on the textbook assignments.
