I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Spanish 404 Advanced Spanish Grammar

3c-01-3sh

Prerequisite: Sp 221 or equivalent and SP 230 and senior standing or departmental permission

An in-depth study of Spanish syntax and morphology. Required for all majors.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students will analyze the grammatical and syntactical structures of Spanish in detail through written exercises, readings of authentic materials, and written practice.
- 2. Students will manipulate the language with a high degree of flexibility and accuracy.
- 3. Students will acquire a heightened insight regarding the problems of Spanish grammar, syntax and morphology, and the conttrasts and relationships between English and Spanish.
- 4. Students will learn idiomatic expressions and word use.
