 - 1) Addition of EDEX 323 Instruction of English Language Learners with Special Needs
 - 2) Change in core from requiring GEOG 213 Cartography and GEOG 230 Cultural Geography to requiring GEOG 213 Cartography, GEOG 231 Economic Geography, and GEOG 411 History of Geography.
 - 3) Removal of Human Geography category in Major electives.
 - 4) Addition of footnote about GEOG 104 Geography of the Non-Western World being able to substitute as a Regional Geography course.
 - 5) Addition of CHSS 342 Social Studies Teaching Lab
 - 6) Addition of SOC 231 Contemporary Social Problems
 - 7) Removal of footnote about HIST 201 and 202 not being appropriate for students.

3. Rationale for Changes:

- 1) The Pennsylvania Department of Education recently stipulated that Secondary Teaching licenses will only be issued to those students that have completed a minimum of 256 contact hours of instruction dealing with Special Education as well as a minimum of 64 contact hours of instruction dealing with English Language Learners (E.L.L.) within their licensure programs. While these requirements are already met to some extent by the existing courses, it is necessary to incorporate EDEX 323 into the program to reach the total number of required contact hours.
- 2 & 3) The change in the core requirements and the removal of the GEOG 230 from the core is being done to accommodate the reintroduction of SOC 231 Contemporary Social Problems without exceeding 123 total credits. GEOG 231 Economic Geography and GEOG 411 History of Geography (which is essentially History of Human Geography) were selected to become part of the core because these courses are both required in the BA in Geography, which will make the BSED degree match the BA more closely.
 - 4) This footnote codifies a common practice in the department of substituting GEOG 104 Geography of the Non-Western World which is a regional geography course for one of the 200 level regional courses, if a student takes it before entering the track. This will make graduation checkouts easier.
 - 5) CHSS 342 Social Studies Teaching Lab is being added to address a deficiency in the existing licensure program, particular to Social Studies. As the Social Studies Education Program encompasses numerous disciplines (Anthropology, Communication, Economics, Geography, History, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology) it has proven a challenge to provide students with sufficient opportunities to work in these fields in an effective time-frame. With calls by the Pennsylvania Department of Education for an increased emphasis on instruction dealing with special needs and English Language Learners, opportunities for content-specific instruction have further decreased.
 - 6) SOC 231 Contemporary Social Problems was in the SSED/Geography program before the 120 credit mandate. It was removed to help bring the degree from 129 credits to 120 credits. This class was selected to be removed because at that point in time PDE had separated Sociology and Anthropology from the other Social Sciences in the certification. These disciplines are again part of the certification. A Sociology course has remained part of the Social Studies/History Track.
 - 7) At one point in time the History Department allowed HIST 195 to substitute for HIST 202 because they covered the same time period. Several years ago the History Department decided

to no longer allow that substitution.

Part III. Implementation.

- 1. Students already in the program will be able to finish their program based on the current requirements or they may select some of the new course requirements especially those in the Social Studies portion of the program. Most students currently take Economic Geography as one of their Human Geography courses. Additionally several have taken History of Geography when they needed a writing intensive in the major. Since the sociology requirement was dropped I have encouraged students to use their one free elective to take a sociology course. According to PDE students will need to complete the old degree requirements by December 31, 2012 or else they will be required to complete the additional requirements.
- 2. Faculty resources are adequate because these courses in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences are regularly offered. All education majors are being required to add the additional course and content to their programs. The CHSS 1 credit course will be attached to the load of the instructor in History who teaches EDUC 342.
- 3. These changes will not impact other resources in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences since they already regularly offered.
- 4. These changes are not anticipated to alter the number of students interested in the Social Studies Education/Geography Track.

Part IV. Periodic Assessment

- 1. There are several measures used as formative and summative data to evaluate the revised program's effectiveness. These include: 1) student course evaluation data, 2) formal and informal meetings of program faculty 3) periodic assessment of the core Geography courses, Praxis scores and KARS assessments
- 2. The Geography and Regional Planning Department annually evaluates its programs.
- 3. NCATE (National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education), NCSS (National Council for the Social Studies) and PDE all schedule their reaccreditation in the same year on a 5 year cycle.
