- a) Cross listing will support curricular flexibility by clearly identifying Regional Planning as a separate major, will improve graduation check out, and will move us toward our goal of program accreditation.
- b) Introduction to Planning (RP 350) is being proposed as a prerequisite for planning majors taking Land Use Policy. In the past we have relied on advising to keep students within a recognized course sequence. We have always advised students to take Introduction to Planning before taking additional planning courses. Unfortunately 'discretionary' advising has, on occasion resulted in mischief for students; they wind up in this more advanced class unfamiliar with the concepts and issues underlying much of the discussion. Geography majors taking the course as GE 464 would primarily be those in the Economic Geography Track and thus Introduction to Planning is not required for their major, although they may take it as an elective. The most

essential elements of Introduction that pertain to Land Use Policy will be reviewed at the beginning of the semester for the benefit of all of the students.
