

b. List of All Associated Changes for Environmental Geographer Track.

- 1) Dropping Physical Geography (GE 241) as a core requirement and replacing it with a controlled elective of Climatology (GE 341) or Physiography (GE 342).
- 2) Addition of Geography of Energy (GE 335) to the Environmental Geographer Track.
- 3) Liberal Studies and foreign language numbers are changing to be more accurate.

3) Rationale for Changes

1) GE 241 Physical Geography is being dropped as a required course* because it has become redundant. Students coming to the department are better prepared in physical geography and we find it more appropriate professionally that they complete the requirement (GE 341 Climatology or GE 342 Physiography) at an upper division content level. Informally the department has been allowing students to substitute either GE 341 or GE 342 for Physical Geography.

^{*}The course itself is not being deleted at this time.

2) This course was inactive and is now being taught in the Spring of 1998. It will alternate every other year with GE 333 Geography of Trade and Transportation. We are able to meet the current demand for Trade and Transportation in alternate years while still increasing opportunities in the Environmental Track by reintroducing Geography of Energy.

The dynamic systems approach to energy issues blends well with the other environmental courses currently in the track: physiography, climatology, fresh water resources, and conservation. The content of this course is very appropriate for the environmental track as evidenced by the catalog description:

GE 335 Geography of Energy

3 s.h.

Energy production and consumption in human societies through time are considered to provide the background necessary for understanding contemporary problems. Emphasis is on locational and environmental aspects of energy in the United States.

Part III. Implementation.

- 1) Students in the program will now have two options for their Physical Geography requirement. One is usually offered in the Fall and one in the Spring. Many current students have been allowed to substitute GE 341 Climatology or GE 342 Physiography for GE 241 Physical Geography.
 - In the track there will also be an additional option by adding Geography of Energy back into the curriculum. This additional course will be beneficial because the Environmental Track is a popular option in the department and students were having trouble scheduling some courses.
- 2) The revisions will not impact teaching loads because these courses are currently in the program. Physical Geography will not be offered as frequently and it will free up time to offer other major courses. Geography of Energy is being offered in Spring 1998 and it will alternate with Trade and Transportation.
- 3) Other resources are adequate.
- 4) We expect no change in the number of students because of this revision.
