Most students already used their free elective to take a second course in Human Geography. Waivers will be granted if it is necessary.
- 2. The proposed revisions will not effect teaching loads. All of the courses are already on the books and regularly taught. The course deletion in the Geography Department has been redirected towards more upper division environmental courses rather than GE 241 Physical Geography.
- 3. Other resources are adequate as well.
- 4. We do not expect any increases or decreases in enrollment because of these changes.
