The writing assignments for HIST 332 Early China for Fall 2013 were

Weekly ticket to class. This was essentially an ungraded assignment where students were asked to bring in a paragraph or two each Monday summarizing the main points of one of the readings for the week. The purpose of it was to get them to do the readings and think about them before class.

**Exams** Two take home exams where students were given about a week to write essays on a couple of topics and analyzing a primary source. The purpose of these was to get students to synthesize some of the information from the readings and class discussion

Analysis papers The most important part of the class. Students had to select at least five of our primary and secondary sources and write analysis of each of them. They could pick whichever ones they wanted during the semester. These could be revised, and they also had the option of doing more than five and keeping the high scores. We did samples of an analysis of both primary and secondary sources in class, and usually discussed most of the readings in class at some point during the week. (Analysis papers were due the week after we had discussed the reading in class, while tickets to class were due the Monday of the week we would be discussing them.) The point of these was to have them engage seriously with both primary and secondary sources.
