SYLLABUS

I. CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION

HI 327 (527) CONTEMPORARY RUSSIA AND THE SOVIET UNION 3c-01-3sh

The course analyzes the attempts at modernization by Imperial Russia, the creation of the Soviet Union and further modernization, and the collapse of the Soviet Union from 1855 to the present.

PREREQUISITES: Sophomore standing, completion of HI 195 (non-majors).

II. STUDENT OBJECTIVES

A. Content:

- ...Will be able to use and further develop critical skills in relation to appropriate primary and secondary sources.
- ...Will gain an understanding of the nature and development of historical debate in relation to the themes.
- ...Will appraise the forces which led to the revolutions of 1917 and gain a critical understanding of the ensuing transformation of Russia by the Bolsheviks.
- ...Will assess the failure of Soviet organization and the resulting development of independent states.

B. Skills:

- ...Will be familiar with the various models used to analyze Russian and Soviet history.
- ...Will be able to identify the geographic, cultural, ethnic, and religious differences of the peoples comprising the Soviet republics.
- ...Will be able to make continuing comparisons between the Soviet Union and Western society, culturally, economically, and politically.

The major emphasis will be on broad questions addressing themes pursued in the course, as well as short "identification essays." Graduate students will be expected to write a research paper or present oral reports in consultation with the instructor.

The History 327 (527) course was submitted for approval as a Liberal Studies elective and as a non-Western course. I also took the opportunity to change the title to take into consideration the recent changes in Russia. Since the course has always covered contemporary events, this does not constitute a change in content.

As for the change in course requirements, that was dictated by an agreement between the History Department and the Graduate Committee of the Senate. The agreement is that <u>all</u> History dual level courses would require that students have at least sophomore standing and that non-majors have taken HI 195-Modern Era. That understanding has been communicated to Dr. Duntley by Dr. Lehman.
