Part II. Description of Curriculum Change

1. Proposed Revision:

Adding the requirement of a C or better in JRNL102 Basic Journalistic Skills, JRNL 105 Journalism and Mass Media and JRNL120 Journalistic Writing for graduation with a minor in journalism. Adding JRNL 250 Women and the Press to the list of controlled electives.

2a. Summary of Changes

No courses are changed as a result of this program revision

3. Rationale for change

Journalism is a highly competitive field. Students who minor in journalism intend to work in journalism and/or public relations where command of grammar, spelling, punctuation, style, journalistic writing methods and knowledge of the functioning of the industry are paramount to their success.

JRNL250 Women and the Press has always been a part of the journalism minor as a controlled elective. The department is not clear about when it was deleted from the list in the catalog. Despite that, this course will provide minors with the knowledge of diversity issues in the field.

Part III. Implementation

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the program?

Students currently enrolled in the journalism minor will not be required to meet these new standards; however, they will be advised that the competitive nature of this field does entail a high degree of proficiency.

2. Are faculty resources adequate?

Yes. There will be no need for change in faculty resources.

3. Are other resources adequate?

Yes. No other resources are affected.

4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions? If so, how will the department adjust?

Students who fail to achieve a grade of C or better on their first attempt may decide to drop the major. However, there are a number of journalism courses that students may take without being a major or a minor. So, the department does not anticipate a major change in course enrollments.

Part IV. Periodic Assessment

1. Describe the evaluation plan. Include evaluation criteria. Specify how student input will be incorporated into the evaluation process.

The department reviews the minor program every five years as part of the department's fiveyear program review. Evaluation criteria include the following:

- a. Number of minors who enroll in the program each year
- b. Retention of minors through completion of the program
- c. Number of minors who complete the program each year
- d. The elective courses chosen by minors

Students and alumni will be surveyed as part of the evaluation process to ascertain whether the quantity of minor courses is sufficient to meet the students'/graduates' needs.

2. Specify the frequency of evaluations.

The evaluation will be conducted every five years.

3. Identify the evaluating entity.

The department program review committee and the outside evaluators for the department's five-year program review will be the evaluating entities. In addition, the accrediting agency for journalism programs (ACEJMC: Accrediting Council for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication) will also be part of the evaluation process as the department moves towards accreditation.


