CATALOG DESCRIPTION OF JOURNALISM MINOR

The journalism department offers an 18-credit minor designed to complement any major. Three three-credit courses are required: JN 105/Journalism and Mass Media, JN 106/Basic Journalistic Skills and JN 120/Journalistic Writing. The remaining nine credits may be taken from the list of journalism major courses. Internship credits do not apply toward the 18-credit minor; however, a student in the minor program may take an internship, the credits of which will apply as free electives.

Formal written approval is required to be admitted to the minor in journalism.

DESCRIPTION OF JOURNALISM MINOR

The minor offered by the journalism department is an 18-credit program designed to complet any major. At present the journalism major requires 30 semester hours, 6 of which may be internship credits.

The journalism faculty believe a carefully constructed minor is appropriate at this time. Many majors from other disciplines enroll--or attempt to enroll--in journalism courses. While we accommodate as many non-majors as possible, we believe that restricting course enrollment first to majors and minors will result in better utilization of class activities and requirements.

The journalism minor has three required courses — JN 105/Journalism and Mass Media, JN 106/Basic Journalistic Skills and JN 120/Journalistic Writing, taken in this sequence As with the major program, a C or better in each of the required courses is necessary before enrollment in the next sequential course.

These courses, also required of our majors, provide an examination of the roles and goals of all media; emphasize grammar, punctuation, spelling, AP Stylebook, and offer intensive practice in writing skills for all news media.

The remaining three courses may be chosen by the student from the major courses offered by the department. While a minor will not be assigned an adviser, the student will be given an advisory handout (see attachment) as a guide to the selection of the three optional courses.

Internship credits do <u>not</u> count toward the 18-credit minor. However, a minor can arrange for an appropriate internship beyond the 18-credit requirement.

A minor in journalism will be recognized on the application for graduation, on the student's transcript and on the department's graduation ceremony program.

In order to enroll as a minor in the journalism department, the student must complete a formal application in the department office.

ADVISORY ON JOURNALISM MINOR

A minor in journalism requires that a student take 18 credits. Three courses (9 credits) are required: JN 105/Journalism and Mass Media, JN 106/Basic Journalistic Skills and JN 120/Journalistic Writing, taken in this sequence. As with the major program, a C or better in each of the required courses is necessary before enrollment in the next sequential course. Three additional courses (9 credits) may be chosen from the list of major courses (attached).

Internship credits do <u>not</u> count toward the 18-credit minor. However, a minor can arrange for an appropriate internship beyond the 18-credit requirement.

A formal application to be a journalism minor must be completed in the journalism office.

A minor will not be assigned an academic adviser. However, the minor may feel free to consult with the department chairman as necessary.

A minor in journalism will be recognized on the application for graduation, on the student's transcript and on the department's graduation ceremony program.

The minor will be entitled to receive all departmental publications and to attend all departmental professional and social functions.

As you know, some majors and more parents will view a Journalism minor as practical preparation for jobs which depend on demonstrated writing skill. Some of them already show a willingness to take courses which they expect to impress prospective employers.
