DELETIONS:

- 1. Natural Science requirement adjusted to meet the new Liberal Studies requirement. BIOL 104 Human Biology and one other 4 credit laboratory course will meet requirement.
- 2. LBST 499 Senior Synthesis deleted to meet the new Liberal Studies requirement.
- 3. HPED 221 Structure and Function and HPED 343 Exercise Physiology will be deleted with the content combined into a new course HPED 256 Applied Anatomy of Physiology for Sport. Content in HPED 256 will emphasize the concepts necessary for practitioners in the sport management field.
- 4. HPED 442 Seminar in HPE will be deleted with some content added to the content of a new course, HPED 465 Sport Management Capstone, which will serve as the capstone course specifically for Sport Administration majors.
- 5. HPED 430 American Women and Sport will be deleted from the list of choices under major electives. This course has not been offered for 10 years because of the lack of available department complement.

ADDITION OF EXISTING COURSES:

1. Additional courses will be added to the Major Elective list where majors will now choose two courses from the list instead of one. Additional courses were chosen based on the 12 Areas of Curriculum Emphasis provided by the Commission on Sport Management Accreditation (COSMA) and recommended by the External Advisory Committee for the IUP Sport Administration Program.

REVISED COURSES:

1. HPED 460 Law and Issues in Managing Sport will expand from a 2 credit course to a 3 credit course so that additional content can be added to the course to address NCAA Compliance issues and issues related to electronic communication technology and problems created by misuse by athletes, coaches, and sport managers.

NEW COURSES:

- HPED 256 Anatomy and Physiology in Sport will provide the concepts necessary for
 practitioners in managing sports. This course will combine the basic content of HPED
 221 Structure and Function and HPED 343 Exercise Physiology. HPED 256 will focus
 the content on theory and practical application in a sport setting. HPED 221 and HPED
 343 will continue to provide necessary concepts for other majors in the department.
- 2. HPED 351 Managing Budgets and Technology in Sport will be added to the Sport Administration requirements to meet the 12 Areas of Curriculum Emphasis from the COSMA guidelines. Specifically, the course will strengthen the content area for technology and finance. Along with FIN 310 Fundamentals of Finance, HPED 350 will provide specific applications to finance within the sport industry. This course will also emphasize software systems used in the sport industry.
- 3. HPED 465 Sport Management Capstone will provide Sport Administration students with the culminating activities specific to managers in the sport industry. This course will strengthen four areas in the 12 Areas of Curriculum Emphasis, including Leadership, Ethics, Governance, and Social and Psychological content.

LIBERAL STUDIES RATIONALE:

1. Sport administration majors need HPED 143, FDNT 143, or NURS 143 as their Dimensions of Wellness course because the content is essential to their major.

3. Rationale for changes

The IUP Sport Administration program has experienced five-fold growth in the past decade. These changes will position the department to seek accreditation. The Commission on Sport Management Accreditation (COSMA) was formed in 2009 to replace the old accrediting agency for sport management programs called the North American Society of Sport Management (NASSM). COSMA published guidelines for the curriculum for sport management academic programs and also established a mechanism for program accreditation. Included in the COSMA guidelines are 12 Areas of Curriculum Emphasis. The proposed program revisions are designed to match the IUP Sport Administration program with the COSMA guidelines.

Part III. Implementation

- 1. Current students will not be affected by the program change. The proposed new courses have begun to be offered as HPED 481 Special Topics to create a seamless transition period.
- 2. Faculty resources are adequate for the proposed changes. Departmental faculty have been assigned HPED 481 sections of the proposed new courses. No disruptions to the department load have occurred.
 - a. Majors will take HPED 256 instead of HPED 221 and HPED 343 which will result in less sections of both HPED 221 and HPED 343.
 - b. Majors will take HPED 465 instead of HPED 442. HPED 465 will be offered with 45 students per section while HPED 442 is capped at 25 students which will result in less sections of HPED 442.
 - c. All HPED Sport Administration course sections are offered with seat capacities of 50 70 students resulting in only one section of a particular Sport Administration course being offered in a semester instead of two.

- 3. All other resources are adequate including instructional space, equipment, and supplies.
- 4. The department recently hired an additional sport administration faculty member to share in the instruction of the courses in the major.

Part IV. Periodic Assessment

- 1. The evaluation plan for the Sport Administration program consists of an annual review and a major five year review. Each year the Sport Administration faculty meet with the Sport Administration Advisory Committee which consists of sport industry professional leaders to receive their suggestions for the program. This meeting helps the faculty to gauge current trends in the field and student readiness to enter the profession. In addition, the Sport Administration faculty meet yearly to review the program as it matches the COSMA guidelines.
- 2. A complete review of the program is conducted every five years that produces a report for the IUP Provost and the PA State System of Higher Education. The five year program evaluation includes:
 - + a survey of current students
 - + a survey of recent graduates
 - + in-depth discussion with the external program Advisory Committee
 - + a survey of internship site supervisors
 - + a review of the program by a group of internal reviewers
 - + a review of the program by an external reviewer

This process concludes with a comprehensive report.

3. The process solicits input from current and former students, Advisory Committee members, internship site supervisors, internal reviewers, and an external reviewer.

3.2 Common Professional Component

Excellence in sport management education at the undergraduate level requires coverage of the key content areas of the sport management field. Thus the Common Professional Component (CPC) topical areas, as outlined below, should be adequately covered within the content of undergraduate sport management degree programs.

- A) Social, psychological and international foundations of sport
- B) Management
 - 1) Sport management principles
 - 2) Sport leadership
 - 3) Sport operations management/event & venue management
 - 4) Sport Governance
- C) Ethics in sport management
- D) Sport Marketing & Communication
- E) Finance/Accounting/Economics
 - 1) Principles of sport finance
 - 2) Accounting
 - 3) Economics of sport
- F) Legal aspects of sport
- G) Integrative Experience, such as:
 - 1) Strategic Management/Policy
 - 2) Internship
 - 3) Capstone experience (an experience that enables a student to demonstrate the capacity to synthesize and apply knowledge, such as a thesis, project, comprehensive examination or course, etc.)

Description

The COSMA expects that the curriculum of accredited undergraduate degree programs will provide a broadly based, functional education in sport management. The purpose of this CPC principle is to ensure that the CPC topical areas are covered in undergraduate sport management degree programs. The COSMA does not expect, however, that all of the CPC topical areas will be covered equally.

Certain specialized undergraduate degree programs may not cover all the CPC topical areas because of having a different focus than that of mainstream sport management degree programs. To the extent that such specialized programs are mission-driven, academically rigorous, and market-responsive, some variance from the CPC topical areas may be justifiable. It is the responsibility of the institution to provide appropriate rationale for any significant CPC variations.

Compliance with the CPC principle is examined by using the course content contained in the undergraduate curriculum of all sport management programs. There is no requirement that each CPC topical area must be covered by a specific course. It is expected that the use of information technology will be appropriately integrated with some of the CPC topical areas.

For each required undergraduate course, the Abbreviated Course Syllabus should include a course outline specifying the CPC coverage in that course. Because a course may simultaneously cover multiple topics (for example, consumer behavior covered in a marketing course may also count towards psychological foundations), it is normal for the total hours of CPC coverage in a course to exceed the actual number of scheduled student contact hours.

Self Study Guidelines

Undergraduate Programs: The Common Professional Component (CPC) is comprised of your undergraduate sport management core, which represents the required sport management courses in an undergraduate major, concentration, or degree program. The CPC consists of topical areas in sport management as listed above. You need to identify where the topical areas in the CPC are covered in your required course offerings. This requires that you first complete an Abbreviated Course Syllabus for each required course as shown in Figure 1 of the Appendix.

In the self study, provide the following information:

- 1. An Abbreviated Course Syllabus for each required course in your undergraduate sport management core (these should be placed in the Appendix)
- 2. A separate CPC table (Table 1) for each undergraduate degree program, major, or concentration that contains a different sport management core. This includes any interdisciplinary and specialized degree programs with substantial sport management content for which you are seeking COSM4 accreditation.
- 3. If you are seeking COSMA accreditation for any interdisciplinary or specialized degree programs that do not cover all of the CPC topical areas, provide a rationale for this variation in CPC coverage.
- 4. To obtain full CPC credit for "required courses" in majors or concentrations over and above your undergraduate sport management core, develop a separate CPC table for each major or concentration.

<u>Note</u>: If you have a required course in your undergraduate sport management core that is taught by an academic department outside of your academic unit/sport management program, prepare a syllabus and include it and the contact hours with this section of the self study.

A sample table summarizing contact hours for all required courses in an undergraduate sport management core is shown in Table 1, along with a summary of CPC topical areas covered in each course. This information comes directly from the Recap section in a syllabus.

Master's Degree and Doctoral Programs: The CPC requirement does not apply to master's degree and doctoral programs.

Note: The normal range for the contact hour totals for an individual course is 50 - 65 in a semester program, although some integrative courses may be higher. The normal range for the contact hour totals for a CPC area is from approximately 20 to over 100 in a semester program. In both cases, the assumption involves three-hour courses with 45 class contact hours during a semester. This matrix is an excellent way to review the academic content of a degree program.

3.3 General Education

Excellence in sport management education at the undergraduate level requires a broad-based general education. Thus general education should comprise a significant portion (usually at least 33 percent) of the total credits required for an undergraduate degree.

Description

In bachelor's degree programs, general education requirements consist primarily of liberal arts and related courses. Courses offered within the sport management program, which are conceived and taught in relation to other realms of human experience, also may be appropriately included in the category of general education. For example, courses in introductory information technology may meet the general education requirements of sport management students.

Self Study Guidelines

Undergraduate Programs: Each institution establishes the general education requirements for a bachelor's degree. For COSMA purposes, general education consists primarily of courses (liberal arts) required of all bachelor's degree-seeking students. It is possible to have some courses count both as meeting the general education requirements of the institution and the core requirements.

Please have on file and make available for inspection by the evaluators, curriculum sheets, degree plans, degree audit forms, or other documents to reflect that the general education requirement is being fulfilled for graduation.

In the self-study:

- 1. Complete Table 2, showing the total number of credit hours required for a sport management degree at the bachelor's level, subdivided into the total number of student credit hours to meet the institution's general education requirements and the total hours of sport management course requirements.
- 2. Identify the catalog page numbers which contain the description of each sport management program.

<u>Note</u>: International institutions without U.S.-based regional accreditation should contact the COSMA headquarters for additional information concerning responding to this principle.

Master's Degree and Doctoral Programs: This principle does not apply to master's degree and doctoral programs.

3.4 Breadth and Depth of Curriculum

Excellence in sport management education requires that undergraduate sport management degree programs include sufficient advanced courses to prepare students for careers and/or further study. In areas of sport management specialization, breadth and depth beyond the common professional component should be demonstrated. (Normally, a minimum of 25 percent of the total credits for an undergraduate degree should be dedicated to sport management courses.)

Description

Undergraduate degree programs should: (1) have content-specific courses taught specifically in sport management. (2) require appropriate prerequisites, and (3) offer students opportunities to demonstrate breadth and depth of knowledge in the area of sport management.

Self Study Guidelines

Undergraduate Programs: Use Table 2 to show the percent of sport management courses that are required to earn a bachelor's degree. These courses include the sport management core, the required courses beyond the core, and elective courses. If any degree programs require less than 25 percent sport management courses, provide the rationale.

Master's Degree and Doctoral Programs: This principle does not apply to master's degree and doctoral programs.

3.5 Curriculum Review and Improvement

Excellence in sport management education requires curricula that are both current and relevant. Curriculum review and improvement, therefore, should be an ongoing process that is supported by outcomes assessment, the results of which are used to ensure excellence in the sport management programs.

Description

The sport management faculty should participate in the continuous review of the curricula and recommend changes and improvements as deemed appropriate. It is essential that assessment of student learning outcomes be used in this review process.

In addition, periodic surveys should be conducted of graduates, and the employers of interns or graduates, to obtain information with which to assess the success of degree programs in meeting the needs of students and the demands of employers. The results of the review and assessments should be used to identify the changes and improvements that are needed, if any, in the academic programs.

Self Study Guidelines

In the self-study:

- Describe your process of continuous evaluation of sport management courses. This
 description should include an explanation of the ways in which outcomes assessment
 supports curriculum review and improvement in your academic unit/sport management
 program.
- Document the involvement of your faculty in the periodic review of sport management degree programs and curricula.
- 3. Describe how your alumni, the sport management community, and other outside groups are involved in the periodic review of your sport management programs and curriculum.
- 4. Describe the extent to which the sport management faculty is involved in the evaluation of the institution's general education program.
- 5. Describe the process for changing your curriculum or developing a new degree program for your academic unit/sport management program. If this process is described in your Faculty Handbook, provide the page numbers.
