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Part II. Description of Curriculum Change

I. Complete catalog description for new track. This includes both the description about the track and the list of courses and credits for the new track.

The bachelor of science degree with a major in management offers six tracks in which students can concentrate: general management, operations management, entrepreneurship and small business management, energy management, accounting and finance energy track, and professional land resource management track.

• General Management Track. While both management theory and application are taught in all of the department's majors, the track is distinguished by its emphasis on the achievement of organized goals through the efforts of organization members.

• Operations Management Track. Students in this track are well grounded in both theory and application, focusing on production, operations, quality issues, and inventory and capacity management.

• Entrepreneurship and Small Business Management Track. Students taking this track will focus on creation and operation of a small business. This track is also for graduates who will be working in small businesses where the manager often must perform several managerial roles and manage several functions.

• Energy Management Track. This is an interdisciplinary track that offers an introduction to the global energy industry from a number of perspectives including geography, geoscience and business courses.

• Energy Accounting and Finance Track. Students taking this track will focus on accounting, business law and finance issues related to the energy industry.

• Professional Land Resource Management Track. Students taking this track will focus on economic and law issues related to land and natural resource management as they pertain to the energy industry.

2. A detailed description for the track including a rationale/justification, credit requirements, sequencing and restrictions.

Rationale/Justification:

Over the past 15 years significant changes have taken place in the energy industry. One of the primary changes was the extraction of natural gas – using the hydraulic fracturing process – from the Marcellus and Utica shale layers. The long term U.S. objective is to become less dependent on foreign energy imports and more on domestic gas and oil reserves as well as other renewable energy sources. This goal is now attainable due to technological advances in energy exploration and production. While some controversy continues regarding the implications of extensive drilling, it is clear that the U.S. is focused on the use of diversified energy sources. This change is particularly important because of increasing demand for energy worldwide. As a result of these changes, the energy management field is experiencing a growing need for personnel with skills related to all aspects of the energy field.

This program is open to all students but we anticipate the majority of the students will either be new or existing College of Business students may add this as a double major.

2. Are faculty resources adequate? If you are not requesting or have not been authorized to hire additional faculty, demonstrate how these courses will fit into the schedule(s) of current faculty. What will be taught less frequently or in fewer sections to make this possible?

These tracks are a major priority for IUP if we are to remain competitive. In the beginning, the department anticipates only a few students to start. The proposed program includes liberal studies, business core and energy industryrelated coursework. Students can be absorbed into existing sections of liberal studies and business core coursework as well as existing coursework in geography, geology and economics. Initially, single sections of remaining coursework can be taught by existing faculty in accounting, finance and management. However, we hope to find a suitable professional from the energy field to teach (as an adjunct) the projected one-section offering per year. We strongly feel that a suitable practitioner (professional) from the field can bring the cutting edge content for our students, which will be a great value-adding proposition.

- 3. Are other resources adequate? Yes (Space, equipment, supplies, travel funds)
- 4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions? If so, how will the department adjust?

The management department expects maybe 10 students initially and again, if the programs take off other resources will need to be directed to it.

Currently the entire curriculum of the Eberly College of Business and Information Technology comes under regular review through our accreditation process. To remain accredited, the college has instituted what is called Assurance of Learning (AoL), which requires all core courses to evaluate curriculum annually. The AoL effort will be soon be expanded to cover all majors, in addition to the business core.
