MA 100 Intermediate Algebra 3c-01-3sh Note: A student may not take MA 100 Intermediate Algebra after successfully completing MA 110 or a calculus course without the written approval of the mathematics department chairperson. A basic course in algebra including factoring, exponents and radicals, systems of linear equations, complex fractions, and inequalities. Designed for those students who lack the basic algebraic skills required in MA 110 Elementary Functions. This course will not meet Liberal Studies math requirements.

As a result of the motion of December 7, 1993, the Undergraduate Committee of the Senate met with the Chairperson of the Mathematics Department to discuss the appropriateness of MA 100 at IUP. The discussion also involved a comparison of this course with similar courses at other institutions, and a review of work done toward articulation with community colleges by IUP and other SSHE institutions. In the process of looking at similar courses at other institutions, the committee suggested a name change might be in order. This is stated in the Senate Agenda of May 4, 1994.

UNIVERSITY SENATE December 7, 1993

NEW BUSINESS

MOTION:

THE UNIVERSITY SENATE REQUESTS the Curriculum Committee to consider changing the numbers on the following courses so that the first digit is zero (0), and that the Committee report its decision to the University Senate during the spring semester of 1994.

ED 150	Educational Planning
ED 160	Learning Strategies
ED 170	Career Exploration
EN 100	Basic Writing
MA 100	Basic Algebra

RATIONALE:

The courses are courses necessary to have at IUP. I benefitted from such courses as an undergraduate myself.

When EN 100 & MA 100 came to the Senate in 1975, the Senate had a considerable debate. There was a recognized need for the courses, yet a great reluctance to offer credit for graduation from coilege for courses that are specifically to prepare students for college entrance, that is, by definition for courses are not at the coilege level. Given the regulations newly developed at the time in the Collective Bargaining Agreement, the only way to pay the instructors for the courses was to have the courses officially designated and designated for graduation credit. The Senate passed both courses as a three-year experiment and with the agreement that they be offered no more than three sections at a time, in order not to dilute the BA degree significantly. This semester there are twenty sections of EN 100 and eight of MA 100. (The grade inflation is not the only way to erode the IUP degree.)

Some years later, the ingenious regulation was developed of having courses established officially that would not be credited toward graduation. These begin with the digit zero. To change the numbering of the five courses would help strengthen the IUP degree.

MOTION:

The University Senate requests the Administration to check the policies the Senate has passed since 1971 and that Trustees have accepted to see that they are in the Administrative Manual, and that the Administration report its findings to the Senate in 1994.

RATICHALE:

In the past three years I have had trouble finding some of the regulations under the responsibility of the Committee on Libraries and Educational Services that the Senate had passed. I would not be surprised if such has not happened in other areas. It would not take long to go through the Trustees Minutes to spot what has been passed. An excellent example is the regulation for the Final Exams. What is in the PENN yesterdar is much more than is in the Administrative Manual.

Senate Agenda, May 4, 1994

The Undergraduate Curriculum Committee has reviewed the courses ED 150, ED 160, ED 5. 170, MA 100 and EN 100 in response to Tom Goodrich's motion about renumbering. The Committee has concluded that all are appropriate as credit-bearing courses. Because thereis some confusion about the course title, Basic Algebra, the math department is considering reviewing this matter in the future.

Department Meeting Items

The Service Courses Committee has two motions for the department to consider: The first motion is the following:

'That the name of the course MA 100 Basic Algebra be changed to Intermediate Algebra."

Rationale: Many students transferring from IUP from other schools report troubles in transferring MA 100 to the appropriate course at the new institution because "basic algebra" translates at these schools to roughly the equivalent of our LC 090 or LC 095, College math I and II. Likewise, students transferring to IUP are often placed in inappropriate courses. Most of these schools refer to the equivalent course as "Intermediate Algebra". This change would remedy this situation and eliminate headaches for the department chair and the transfer office.
