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Description of the Curriculum Change

I. Catalog Description

MUSC 353 French Diction and Literature

1 class hour 1 lab hour

Prerequisites: none

1 semester hour

(1c-1l-1sh)

A laboratory course in French diction for third-or fourth-semester voice majors. Meets for two hours per week. The emphasis is on pronunciation for the stage and the International Phonetic Alphabet. Students will demonstrate skills by singing French solo song literature and operatic repertoire.

II. Course Objectives

Students will be able to

- 1. Demonstrate a basic knowledge of French diction and have a working knowledge of the International Phonetic Alphabet as it pertains to French diction;
- 2. Perform the standard classical 19th and 20th Century French art songs and arias with the correct pronunciation, style and expressive interpretation.

III. Course Outline

- A. Exposure to the songs and arias of 19th and 20th Century France (10 hours)
 - 1. Class Work
 - a. Listening to Recordings of various classical artists performing the repertoire
 - 2. Lab Work
 - a. Singing collectively through the French Song Anthology (Hal Leonard Publisher)
 - b. Individual performances within a master class format

Total of 4 exams

- B. Study and application of the International Phonetic Alphabet (9 hours)
 - 1. Class Work
 - a. Introduction of the IPA symbols pertaining to French diction
 - 2. Lab Work

- 25% Class participation all oral and written exercises on IPA transcriptions, rules on pronunciation, and individual and collective music performances
- 25% Quizzes (announced and unannounced) –writing assignments, and oral readings of IPA transcriptions and texts of the songs and/or arias
- 25% Final Oral and Written Exam

2. Summary of the Proposed Revisions

This course is designed for voice majors to acquire proficiency in French diction for the purpose of performing French repertoire. In order for students to demonstrate their skills, the course will change to 50% lab hours and 50% class hours, and therefore will be listed as 1 semester hour instead of 2.

3. Justification/rationale for the revision

Voice majors need to have a stronger lab component in the diction classes in order to give them adequate experience in vocal pedagogy since they will be teaching voice as future music educators or professional singers. In making this change, the diction courses will be consistent with the other class instrument courses (i.e. MUSC 155 Class Strings, etc.), which are also taught for one semester hour and meet for two hours (1 class hour and 1 lab hour) per week.
