# Syllabus of Record Format

# I. Catalog Description

MU 340 Woodwind Instrument Repair

2 credits 0 lecture hours

2 lab hours (0C-2l-2sh)

Prerequisites: MU 133, Teacher Certification

This course is designed for students preparing for teaching careers in instrumental music. Instruction will be conducted in a laboratory setting and will include the development of the diagnostic and repair skills necessary to deal with the problems most frequently encountered in a public school classroom on the clarinet, flute and saxophone.

# II. Course Objectives

- 1. Students will demonstrate the skills necessary to handle minor and emergency repairs.
- 2. Students will demonstrate the knowledge necessary to practice repair prevention through proper instrument care and maintenance.

# Course Analysis Questionnaire

#### A. Details of the Course

- The course fills an academic need of all Music Education majors who will eventually teach instrumental music in the public schools. In that capacity they will need diagnostic and procedural repair skills to deal with the minor and emergency woodwind instrument problems they will often encounter. The course will fit nicely between Class Woodwinds (MU133), where students learn to play the instruments and Student Teaching when students have to teach the instruments. The course is designed for instrumental music majors as well as for vocal music majors who anticipate accepting a teaching position involving an instrumental component if it is offered to them. The course is not proposed for inclusion in the Liberal Studies course list.
- A2 The course does not require changes in the content of any existing courses.
- A3 The course has never been offered at IUP on a trial basis, but a similar offering was available at one point under special topics.

  That class has run the maximum number of allowed offerings and is here being proposed as a full-blown course.
- A4 No
- A5 The course will not be offered for variable credit.
- A6 For all the reasons described in A1 the course is typically offered at other universities with well-developed musical programs such as Ithaca College, Central Connecticut University and Western Iowa Tech.
- A7 We are not aware that the course is required by an accrediting authority. The course content would be far too extensive to include in any existing course and would consume an inordinate amount of time under any other course description.

### B. Interdisciplinary Implications

- B1 The course will be taught by one instructor.
- B2 There is no relationship between the content of this course and the content of any other courses offered at IUP in other departments.
- B3 A limited number of seats could be made available to students who are properly qualified and who are enrolled in the School of Continuing Education.

# C. Implementation

C1 Faculty resources for this course are adequate. As per the attached Dean's letter, John Kuehn, the anticipated instructor, must reduce his applied music teaching load to six students in order to accommodate this course in his schedule. This reduction will be accomplished by the fall semester of 1996.

- C3 None of the provisions for this course are funded by a grant.
- C4 At the outset the course could be offered once per year, and if the demand indicates the need, the course could be offered every semester.
- C5 The course will have one section per semester.
- C6 The course will be limited to an enrollment of ten because of the need to demonstrate to and carefully observe and evaluate the work of each student.
- C7 As far as we are able to determine there are no enrollment limits or parameters recommended by any professional society.
