NU 407 Skills for Professional Success

1 credit

Prerequisites: must be enrolled in senior level nursing courses

1 lecture hour 0 lab hour (1c-0l-1sh)

I. Catalog Description

This one credit elective for senior nursing majors is designed to help students foster clinical judgment skills by focusing on critical thinking and test-taking. Emphasis is placed on preparing students with the skills that are essential for success on the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN).

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II. Course Objectives

Upon completion of the course the student will:

- 1. Demonstrate clinical problem solving skills utilizing critical thinking, standardized analytical techniques and decision making trees.
- 2. Recognize the implications of computer adaptive testing (CAT) and analyze computerized simulations in preparation for the NCLEX-RN exam.
- 3. Utilize clinical judgment skills in answering test questions that simulate questions comparable to those found on the NCLEX-RN exam while recognizing high index of probability items.
- 4. Effectively apply oral presentation skills while focusing on passing the NCLEX-RN.

Guidelines:

Next, select a vital nursing concept to focus on after reviewing the Weekly Assignments for ACE-IT pertaining to this presentation (see attached form) with the goal of maximizing your own and your classmates learning.
- 2. Next, select an activity, strategy, or creative exercise to accelerate the learning of this concept. The final exam will include Medical Surgical questions number 1 to 920. (Mosby, test). A total of 10 points may be earned by taking the finals.

Course Analysis Questionnaire

Section A: Details of the Course

- A1 This course will be an elective for students enrolled in senior level nursing courses.
- A2 This course does not require changes in the content of existing courses or requirements for this program.
- A3 Three sections of this course were offered on a trial basis as a special topic course in the Spring semester of 1996 and one section was offered in the Fall semester of 1996. Seventy-two students were enrolled in the spring semester and nineteen were enrolled in the fall semester. All students rated it consistently high on student evaluation forms.
- A4 This course is not intended to be a dual level course.
- A5 This course is not to be taken for variable credit
- A6 Other higher education institutions do not currently offer this course.
- A7 The content of this course is not recommended or required by a professional society, accrediting authority, law, or other external agency. However, success on the NCLEX is essential to practice the profession of nursing. This content or these skills cannot be incorporated into an existing course because the required courses are carefully structured to provided essential material. Incorporating this content would require deletion of the content of other nursing courses. Accreditation of the IUP nursing program is dependent on an 80% pass rate on the NCLEX-RN exam.

Section B: Interdisciplinary Implications

- B1 This course will be taught by one instructor.
- B2 This course does not overlap with any courses at the University...
- B3 No seats will be available to students in the School of Continuing Education.

Section C: Implementation

C1 No new faculty are needed to teach this course. One less seminar section would be offered each semester. This would increase the enrollment of existing seminars by one or two students per seminar, which can be easily accommodated.

C2 Other Resources

- a. Current space allocations are adequate to offer this course.
- b. Equipment allocations are adequate to offer this course.
- c. No laboratory supplies or other consumable goods are necessary to teach this course.
- d. Library materials are adequate for this course.
- e. Travel funds are not needed for this course.
- C3 No grant funds are associated with this course.
- C4 Sections of this course will be offered in the Fall and Spring semesters every year.
- One section of this course will be offered in the Fall semester and two sections will be offered in the Spring semester each year.
- C6 Sections of this course will be limited to 30 students. Because of the nature of the class and the learning activities required, it would be difficult to manage a class larger than 30.
- C7 There is no professional society which recommends enrollment limits or parameters for a course of this nature.
