RT 342 Preceptorship in Respiratory Care

(1c-01-1sh)

Prerequisites: RT 326, RT 328, RT 329, RT 330, RT 331. Permission.

An opportunity for students to gain additional clinical experiences in a supervised health care setting. Must meet university and sponsoring preceptorship requirements. May be repeated for a maximum of 5 credits. A minimum of 40 hours is required for each credit.

I. Catalog Description

RT 342 Preceptorship in Respiratory Care

1 credit 0 lecture hour 1 lab hour (0c-var/-1sh)

Prerequisites: RT 326, RT 328, RT 329, RT 330, RT 331. Permission.

An opportunity for students to gain additional clinical experiences in a supervised health care setting. Must meet university and sponsoring preceptorship requirements. May be repeated for a maximum of 5 credits. A minimum of 40 hours is required for each credit.

II. Course Objectives

Under the supervision of a designated preceptor, the student will be able to:

- 1. Utilize critical thinking and decision-making skills.
- 2. Use written and verbal communication skills.
- 3. Identify trends in respiratory care and their impact on health care.
- 4. Investigate research and professional literature related to respiratory care.
- 5. Promote the profession of respiratory care as a member of the interdisciplinary health care team.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to function as a professional member of the health care team.

III. Course Outline

Variable hours within the semester are spent at the health care facility at which a preceptorship experience has been negotiated by the student and approved by the school of respiratory care. Preceptorship hours are variable so as not to interfere with the student's classroom and clinical curriculum hours, yet meet the minimum number of hours required for this course.

Preceptorship experiences and expectations vary based upon each student's academic status (Junior year versus Senior year). Individualized goals and objectives are designed for each academic session the student is enrolled in the preceptorship. They reflect the general course objectives. With each enrollment, the students application and higher order thinking skills are fostered.

IV. Evaluation Methods

Evaluation will adhere to policies and procedures of the designated

health care preceptorship site. Performance and assignments will be formatively and summatively evaluated by the preceptee (student), preceptor (site mentor) and facilitator (faculty).

Letter grades will be assigned according to the following scale:

- A = 90 100%
- B = 80 89%
- C = 70 79%
- D = 65 69%
- F = < 65%
