Addition of ARHI 418 African Art, MUSC 300 Black Music in America and Diaspora, and PNAF 493 Internship in Pan African Studies.

2.3 Rationale for Change

Request for the Internship in Pan African Studies program was inadvertently omitted from the original program proposal for the minor. Students should be able to complete internships in fields where their knowledge of the Pan African world can be applied and further developed. The internship will allow students to take advantage of experiential learning opportunities related to Pan African Studies.

By offering PAS internships, we will provide an opportunity that will benefit the students as they explore unique learning environments, while also benefiting the university by generating additional enrollments, especially during the summer sessions, as this is the typical time for internships.

ARHI 418 African Art and MUSC 300 Black Music in America and Diaspora are recently approved appropriate courses that are also being added.

III. Implementation

- 3.1. The proposed revision will not affect students in the existing program because the internship is not proposed as a requirement of the program. It is being added as an elective.
- 3.2 Pan African Studies internship credits will follow policies standard in most departments. Students will have to apply for an internship, and if approved, the credits will be part of the faculty's load in the summer and an overload if scheduled during the regular academic year. Because Pan African Studies is an interdisciplinary minor, internship credit would have to be approved by the Coordinator of Pan African Studies and the faculty's Chairperson.

Additional resources beyond faculty reimbursement for credit hours will not be needed. Internships will only rely on resources, such as library collections, that are already available to students.

3.2 The addition of internship credits should not affect the number of students enrolled. It is meant to offer additional academic options for Pan African Studies minors.
