General Sociology Track (Substantive Area Changes for Controlled Electives)

List of all associated changes and rationale.

- Add SOC 452 Disability and Society as a controlled elective to the Social Inequality and Social Change and the Individual and Society substantive areas in the General Sociology Track.
- Add SOC 269 (a newly created course recently approved by the Senate) to the Social Inequality and Social Change, Deviance and Social Problems, and Individual and Society substantive areas in the General Sociology Track.
- 3 Delete SOC 339 from Social Organization and Institutions substantive areas in the General Sociology Track.

Rationale.

- The SOC 452 Disability and Society previously was only offered in one substantive area in the General Sociology Track. The disabled population is a large minority population and the course is taught from an inequality perspective and also from a symbolic interaction perspective where the disability is a "master status", therefore, making the course a nice fit with both the Social Inequality and Social Change and the Individual and Society substantive areas. These changes will give students a broader selection of controlled electives in the respective substantive areas.
- The SOC 269 Sociology of Deviance is a newly created course and because of the emphasis on deviant behavior from a sociological perspective is suited for the Social Inequality and Social Change, Individual and Society, and Deviance and Social Problems substantive areas in the General Sociology Track. These additions will give students a broader selection of controlled electives in the respective substantive areas.
- 3 SOC 399 deleted from Social Organization and Institutions because it has been deleted from the catalog.

Implementation.

- 1 How will the revision impact students already in the track?
 Students will have more options available to them in their substantive areas for selecting controlled electives.
- 2 Are faculty resources adequate?

Yes, it is believed that faculty resources are adequate. These are not new courses with the exception of SOC 269 which will be offered with existing faculty by rotating other courses previously taught to other professors.

3 Are other resources adequate?

Yes, for the same reasons listed above.

4 Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students?

No. We anticipate the number of students in the Applied Research Track to remain similar with similar selections for controlled electives; however, they now have more choices.

Describe the evaluation plan.

There is no accrediting body for Sociology, so the only evaluation is the university's five year review.
