## 2. Proposed Description and Number Change

## **SOC 392 Clinical Sociological Practice**

**Prerequisites:** SOC 391

Draws its analysis, diagnosis, and methods from the foundations of sociological theory at the level of intervention with clients. It is strongly recommended that students have at least 6 Sociology credits in their specialized area prior to taking SOC 392 other than SOC 151, 320, 460 and 461.

3. Rationale: The change in course numbers reflects the suggested recommendation of at least 6 substantive credits (300 level, for example Sociology of the Family (SOC 336), Alcohol and Drug Abuse (SOC 335) that should be taken prior to this 300 level course. Substantive credits refer to the student's declared specialization area within the human services. For any specialization the student must have successfully completed 5 classes from the list for his/her specialization. For example, students may choose to specialize in Family and Interpersonal Relations or Juvenile Delinquency or Medical Sociology, among several other specializations. There are many courses on the list that the student can take for his/her specialization. The list for each specialization is what we call their "substantive credits" for the chosen specialization. Students need to have a foundation in sociology prior to learning how to apply sociological thinking to clinical practice in SOC 302 (SOC 392). Students may choose to take the practice sequence, SOC 301 (391) and SOC 302 (392), in their junior or senior year which is why we propose keeping it a 300 level course, but with a higher number than most of their substantive credit options. We believe students will be better prepared for the practice sequence and internship if they have successfully completed at least 6 sociology substantive credits within their area of specialization. Substantive credits do not include SOC 151 Principles of Sociology, SOC 320 Sociological Theory, SOC 460/461 Social Research Methods I and II.
