Part II: THTR 322 Course Revision Description of the Curriculum Change Section 1: Syllabus of Record

I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

THTR 322: Costume Design, 3 credits 3 lecture hours 0 lab hours (3-01-3sh)

Prerequisites: TH 116 or permission

An introduction to the discipline of costume design for the theater with an emphasis on script analysis, figure drawing, character definition, and control of the design elements, supplemented by an overview of costume history.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students will be able to:

- 1. Express an understanding of the role of the costume designer within the collaborative process of creating theater.
- 2. Demonstrate how periods of fashion may be applied to costume design choices.
- 3. Create costume renderings and accompanying paperwork appropriate for characters in a play.
- 4. Analyze a play from the point of view of a costume designer.
- 5. Develop a conceptual framework for making design decisions.
- 6. Conduct research appropriate to the design of costumes for a play.
- 7. Use freehand sketches to communicate design ideas.
- 8. Respond critically to the designs of others.

III. DETAILED COURSE OUTLINE: (note each week of instruction typically includes lectured material, guided in class exercises, and student critiques of their presentations)

- Dress rehearsals

IV. EVALUATION METHODS

The FINAL GRADE will be determined through an average of grades given over the semester weighted by the percentages indicated below.

<u>Class participation</u> (10%): through evaluation of peer critiques as well as in-class participation.

Mid-term examination (20%): an objective exam of the role of costume designer and periods of fashion history.

<u>Design projects</u> (60%): creative design projects on playscripts of the instructor's choice. Students will be evaluated on their ability to analyze the play, develop a credible conceptual framework, conduct appropriate research and create renderings and supporting paperwork.

<u>Final presentations</u> (10%): students will present a portfolio of what they have created in class. An opportunity to rework prior designs or demonstrate new learning will be provided.

Section 2. Summary of the Proposed Revisions:

This revision:

- a) changes prerequisite from THTR 120 Stagecraft, to THTR 116 Fundamentals of Theatrical Design
- b) specifies objectives of the course which build on the objectives of TH116.

Section 3. Justification/Rationale for the revision:

It has been at least 15 years since THTR 322 Costume Design was formally revised. In 1995, the Department of Theater and Dance created a new course, THTR 116 Fundamentals of Theatrical Design, at the suggestion of our accrediting agency--National Association of Schools of Theatre. The purpose of THTR 116 was to provide an introductory overview of theatrical design required for all majors. The purpose of this course, THTR 322, is now to build upon the fundamentals learned in THTR 116 by teaching a method for designing theatrical costumes. It is also certain that curriculum drift has moved this course from its origins, especially with four different costume designers teaching it. Furthermore we wish to change the prerequisite for the course commensurate with its new place in the department's curriculum.

Section 4: Old syllabus of record:

The old syllabus of record is absent from departmental files, probably an indication that it hasn't been revised since its creation in 1977. This course originated before the university required a syllabus of record. The attached course syllabus represents how the course has been taught over the past decade and can serve as a basis for comparison.

The current catalog description of the course reads: Covers design and execution of stage costumes with emphasis on showing how mood and illusion can be created through the proper selection of style, color and texture, supplemented by an overview of stage costuming.

It is currently offered for 3c-01-3sh, which would not change.
