1. Catalog Description of Curriculum Change

The Department of Theater and Dance offers a foundational education in the art, craft, and theory of theater and dance, and an understanding of their significance within the liberal arts and a humanistic view of the world. As embodied art forms, theater and dance require collaboration and discipline to develop talent and enhance creativity. The Department is dedicated to supporting students in developing an aesthetic sensibility and a strong work ethic. These qualities are applied across disciplinary boundaries to create new ideas that have tangible results in production and performance.

The department is committed to:

- 1. providing comprehensive coursework from introductory through advanced levels of study, in all major areas of theater and dance
- providing diverse production opportunities at all levels. These challenge students to apply classroom skills to practical projects and develop proficiency in one or more of the areas of; performance, playwriting, choreography, research, directing, design, management and technical production while stimulating the intellectual and creative growth of both students and faculty
- 3. providing a rich cultural resource for the university and the wider community through high quality live performance
- 4. establishing and cultivating an ethos of creativity, collaboration, personal discipline, and mutual respect among students and faculty
- 5. encouraging the development of original work through combinations of creative processes

The department offers a Bachelor of Arts degree, a dance minor, and a theater minor. The B.A. degree with a major in Theater provides for the study of theater within a broad liberal arts education. The minor in dance totals 18 controlled credits, while a minor in Theater consists of 15 credits in Theater coursework approved by the chairperson of the department.

The Department of Theater and Dance is also the home program for Interdisciplinary Fine Arts degrees with tracks in Dance Arts and Musical Theater. As a practical extension of the academic program, the department offers a variety of production opportunities in the Theater-by-the-Grove Mainstage and Studio theaters. The IUP Dance Theater performs twice annually in Zink and Fisher auditoria.

Admission to the Theater major requires satisfactory completion of an audition or interview, in addition to the university's general admission requirements. Detailed information will be sent to applicants upon request (contact details at www.iup.edu/theater)

The Department of Theater and Dance is a fully accredited institutional member of the National Association of Schools of Theater (NAST).

3. Rationale for Change.

The proposed changes to our curriculum reflect the fact that theater is a constantly evolving art form and that the syllabi of many of our courses have not been reviewed in twenty years. Course content and pedagogy need to reflect contemporary practice for students to be up to date when they graduate. A comprehensive review has been conducted to identify courses that need replacement or modification. Changes also reflect the university wide Liberal Studies revisions, and recommendations from our accrediting body, the National Association of Schools of Theater (NAST). They improve the integrity of the Concentration Areas of Performance, Design/Tech/Management, and Theory and Criticism, while also allowing for a General Studies Concentration Area (a NAST recommendation).

THTR 140 Foundations of Performance provides a unified collaborative experience for the Freshman cohort and ensures consistent levels of understanding among students entering THTR 240 Acting 1. The description change of this course simply identifies THTR 140 as a prerequisite.

The new required courses THTR 211 History and Literature: Classic, THTR 212 History and Literature: Renaissance, and THTR 213 History and Literature: Modern and Contemporary

provide comprehensive knowledge of Western theater from origins to the present day. This resolves a problem in the current course structure where only two of the four available theater history courses are required, meaning that students can graduate with major gaps in their historical knowledge. This is the reason for the deletion of THTR 205 Classic Theater I, THTR 206 Classic Theater II, THTR 207 Modern Theater I, and THTR 208 Modern Theater II. With these changes, the Concentration Area that was formerly Theater History and Theory now becomes Theory and Criticism.

This Concentration Area includes the new course THTR 311 Dramaturgy, which provides knowledge of a rapidly growing field in contemporary theater that involves the practical application of contextual research to production development. The inclusion of electives from the English department in this area offers a broad range of knowledge and the potential for fruitful cross disciplinary links.

Foundational skills in theater drawing and drafting are currently learnt piecemeal in a variety of contexts, and the new course THTR 225 Theater Graphics will provide a unified focus for the teaching of these skills.

The title change of THTR 489 to Design/Tech/Mgt Studio reflects an alignment of the content with companion courses in other department disciplines, and with the way that these terms are used in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, in which we participate.

Minor changes to the Catalog descriptions of THTR 487 Acting Studio and THTR 484 Directing Studio reflect changing circumstances and create better pedagogical practice and learning outcomes.

The deletion of Musical Theater as a Concentration Area relates to the existence of the Interdisciplinary Fine Arts degree with a Musical Theater track, and our response to issues raised in our last NAST review. From the NAST Commission Action Report, April 17 2008:

1. It is not clear why the institution offers two curricular programs in music theater with minimal differences in curricular requirements and two distinct titles.

Finally, the addition of THTR 480 Theater Seminar provides a more focused way of managing our Senior Project capstone experience and assists students with their transition to the professional world. This transition is only addressed piecemeal and tangentially in the current program.

Part III. Implementation. Provide answers to the following questions:

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program? Students already in the program may successfully pursue graduation under the catalog in force when they matriculated, even in the matter of the history requirement. The articulation equivalency of the following will be used:

THTR 205 Classic Theater I = THTR 211 History and Literature: Classic THTR 206 Classic Theater II = THTR 212 History and Literature: Renaissance THTR 207 or 208 Modern Theater I or II = THTR 213 History and Literature: Modern and Contemporary.

2. Are faculty resources adequate? If you are not requesting or have not been authorized to hire additional faculty, demonstrate how this course will fit into the schedule(s) of current faculty.

A hypothetical rotation of course assignments is attached (see Appendices), showing that the courses required for graduation can be taught in a 2 year rotation within the complement of the Department of Theater and Dance (including temporary complement in vacant positions).

- 3. Are other resources adequate? (Space, equipment, supplies, travel funds) This proposal has no additional impact on practical resources.
 - 4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions? If so, how will the department adjust?

We expect this revision to result in a neutral to increasing number of students. It strengthens the program, and so may make us more attractive than we already are. If that is the case, we can take in approximately 20 more majors before reaching serious constraints. Since we only accept majors by audition, we will be able to manage enrollments.

Part IV. Periodic Assessment

Departments are responsible for an on-going review of curriculum. Include information about the department's plan for program evaluation:

The department of Theater and Dance is accredited by the National Association of Schools of Theater (NAST). We therefore must submit this curriculum for plan approval. As stated by NAST,

Plan Approval is required after institutional approval and before students are admitted into a new degree program.

We will submit the curriculum for NAST Plan Approval following the approval of the University Senate.

The Department of Theater and Dance also operates an Assessment Committee that conducts program assessment each year, and meets in May with the whole faculty to review the program. Much of our assessment is conducted through the creation of theatrical productions, and evaluation of student performance that realizes classroom learning, along our assessment rubric (see the attached Practicum Evaluation form).

The Assessment Committee also conducts a survey of graduating seniors, via Qualtrics. A copy of the exit survey is attached. This information is shared with all faculty at the annual assessment meeting.

2. Specify the frequency of the evaluations.

The revised curriculum will be reviewed by the NAST Commission on Accreditation in March 2013. It is appropriate to implement the curriculum before obtaining plan approval from NAST. It will also be evaluated as a part of our periodic self-study and site visit report required by NAST. Our next evaluation will come in 2017.

The Department Assessment Committee evaluates the program annually.

3. Identify the evaluating entity.

The Department of Theater and Dance, and the National Association of Schools of Theater.
