The Women's Studies minor is designed to examine the status and experiences of women from a multidisciplinary perspective. The courses use a variety of methods and disciplinary perspectives to explore the impact of gender on the experiences of the individual. Women's contributions to a variety of fields and the historical, literary, and cultural images of women are also addressed. Students are encouraged to challenge traditional theories and research regarding women and to develop a critical, multidisciplinary, multicultural, and gendered view of the world. Courses taught within the minor typically involve the students through innovative, experiential classroom exercises and written assignments. Courses in Women's Studies address social equity issues and encourage students to perceive themselves as capable of transforming society.

A minor in Women's Studies indicates to the prospective employer an awareness of and sensitivity to gender issues. This awareness may be needed in the following positions: personnel specialist, affirmative action officer, crisis intervention specialist, family and youth services provider, legal advocate. A minor in Women's Studies can contribute to success in a variety of fields including communication, counseling, criminology, education, health, journalism, law, politics, psychology, and applied sociology.

Students interested in attending graduate school will also find a minor in Women's Studies valuable for a variety of areas, including English, history, studies in the social sciences, and law school.

CRITERIA FOR WOMEN'S STUDIES COURSES

The women's studies program represents an interdisciplinary approach to feminist scholarship, the purpose of which is to examine the changing roles of women locally, regionally, nationally, globally, and cross-culturally through time. Courses within this program, including cross-listed courses, should not only reflect this approach but should also meet the following criteria:

- A. Course Content
- Title of course should reflect sensitivity to gender issues.
- 2. Course content must clearly reflect and acquaint students with recent scholarship on women, gender, and/or feminist theory. Traditional texts, when used, should be put into a dialogue with feminist perspectives designed to challenge their assumptions.
- 3. Race, class, ethnicity, sexual orientation and other systems of domination affect how one experiences gender, subordination, and agency. A women's studies course addresses, rather than ignores or dismisses, these differences.
- 4. A women's studies course should do one or more of the following:
 a) critically examine cultural assumptions about gender as well as race, class, etc., e.g. the gender assumptions in traditional methodologies, theories, and research of particular disciplines; b) explore the production of knowledge in art, literature, and other disciplines that reflect on women's gendered, race-affected, and class-bound, etc., experiences; c) equip students to identify and analyze systems of domination that constrain women's lives; and d) focus on providing information about women, their psychology, biology, roles, experiences, history, and contributions.
- 5. Women's studies courses should examine feminist genres, research methods, structures, analytical tools, aesthetics, criticism, contemporary issues, pedagogy, political theory, etc.
- 6. Work by recognized women scholars should be incorporated into the course. Textbooks authored by women should be used when appropriate and available.
- B. Course Evaluation
- 1. All courses in the women's studies program will be reviewed on a fiveyear cycle to evaluate their success in meeting the above criteria.

Note: courses containing information on women, mothering, and gender are not automatically assumed to be women's studies courses.

2. Student Focus

Content of the course and texts should show sensitivity to needs and interests of women students.

C. Instructional Methodology and Professor Qualifications

<u>Teaching</u>. Feminist pedagogy and innovative techniques traditionally used in women's studies courses are encouraged.

<u>Professor qualifications</u>. Professor's qualifications to teach women's studies courses will be based on a) the course syllabus (including content, bibliography, evaluation) and b) vita and/or appropriate presentations of experience.
