3. Rationale for Change

WMST 400: Feminist Theory was approved last year as a new course. We did not at the time do a program revision to include this as an option for the Women's Studies minor and are now resolving that.

Part III. Implementation

- 1. This proposed revision will give students another course with a women's studies prefix as an option for the minor.
- 2. Faculty resources are adequate. The director will normally teach WMST 400: Feminist Theory as part of her teaching duties.
- 3. Other resources are adequate.
- 4. We don't expect this revision to increase or decrease our number of minors.

Part IV. Periodic Assessment

- Women's Studies has a self-assessment plan in which we review the courses being offered to
 ensure that they're offered on a regular basis, that they meet our criteria for a women's studies
 course, and that students feel they're useful to their own learning. Surveys of our current minors
 are a regular part of our self-assessment, and students regularly serve on the curriculum
 committee.
- 2. We survey our students annually and do a larger self-assessment study every five years.
- 3. We self-evaluate with current members of the curriculum committee on which faculty from a variety of disciplines (all with an interest and expertise in women's studies) serve.
