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Class of 2020

The Class of 2020 was warmly welcomed into the SAHE program on August 30, 2018 at the annual Kick-Off program hosted at the IUP College Lodge and Ski Hut by the SAHE Department and Associates for Student Development (ASD). The first portion of Kick-Off began with the faculty, Dr. Mimi Benjamin and Dr. John Lowery providing ways to cope with the adjustment and transition into graduate school. Dr. Tammy Patterson Manko, 1991 SAHE alumna, Director of IUP's Career and Professional Development Center, and 2018 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient, talked with the students about making the most of their SAHE experience. She shared motivational words and gave the students a small token of positivity to take with them. The students also heard from Dr. Amber Racchini, Assistant Professor/Coordinator for Supplemental Instruction and Peer Assistance at IUP, and 2003 SAHE Alumna, who spoke on, "Surviving SAHE: Utilizing Support and Self-Care to Maximize Your Success."

ASD prepared a meal to follow the faculty portion and together, the Classes of 2019 and 2020 discussed the upcoming semester, undergraduate studies, and what led them to student affairs and SAHE in particular. Following dinner, the two cohorts participated in ice-breaker activities and "speed-matching" for potential Cohort Connect matches.

To conclude Kick-Off, Danielle Parker ('19), ASD President, announced each new SAHE member to receive their SAHE pin, which connects them to a network of more than 900 alumni. While students were eager to delve into their assistantships and coursework around the time of Kick-Off, they are now getting settled in and are dedicated to finding their niche in student affairs. Students are creating a sense of community that will help them thrive in the next year and a half.

Two projects have kept me particularly busy this fall: final edits to our book, Multicultural Competence in Student Affairs: Advancing Social Justice and Inclusion (Pope, Reynolds, & Mueller, 2019) and the monograph I'm working on to re-introduce the Knefelkamp, Golec, and Wells (1984, 1985) Practice-to-Theory-to-Practice model. One of the exciting things about the upcoming Multicultural Competence book is that it features case studies written by some of our SAHE alumni and faculty, including Jhane Cummings ('18), Henry Lewis ('14), Windi Sasaki ('04), and Dr. John Lowery. Equally exciting, with respect to the PTP monograph, has been delving into the history of the



authors' work, the early writing, and old videos featuring Lee Knefelkamp. As you may know, Lee died this past September—a great loss to the multiple fields her work influenced, including student affairs, higher education, counseling, and organizational leadership. In October, I joined some of my fellow (one-time) doctoral students of Lee's at one of her favorite restaurants on the upper west side of Manhattan near Teachers College, aptly named "Community". There we shared stories of Lee's humor, her compassion, her brilliance, and her impact on our lives. The trip to New York also gave me an opportunity to make use of the extraordinary Teachers College library and to see some outstanding Broadway shows. This fall also allowed me to travel to Buffalo, NY to work with my colleagues, Raechele Pope and Amy Reynolds, on our book. A trip to Washington D.C. will round out my fall travels. I started the fall semester (actually late summer) with a trip to London and Edinburgh, Scotland. This was my first time in the U.K. and it was everything (and more) that I expected it would be. By the time you're reading this, the fall semester will be coming to a close, my annual holiday concerts with Pittsburgh's Renaissance City Choir will be in full swing, and I will be eager to return to Stouffer Hall and the classroom. 2018 Nancy G. Newkerk Scholarship

In October 2018, the SAHE department announced the recipient of the Nancy J. Newkerk Scholarship for 2018: **Angela Delfine**.

Delfine is an alumna of Saint Vincent College. She has a Bachelor of Arts in English. She completed a practicum in Conferences and Events over the summer of 2018 at Chatham University Eden Hall. Her current practicum is with Saint Vincent College in the Opportunity/Act 101/ SSS-Trio Office. Her assistantship position is at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown as a Graduate Area Coordinator.

Angela's nominators spoke highly of her. One said, ""During her year at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, Angela played a vital role in the further development of the Residence Life program. She is a tireless worker capable of handling any assignment given with her efficiency, excellence, and ease."



"During her time (on the campus), Angela performed like a seasoned professional and continuously demonstrated a student-centered mindset. . . She is hardworking and truly dedicated to student success," said another nominator.

Since 1999, the Nancy Newkerk scholarship has been awarded to a second-year SAHE graduate student who demonstrates outstanding contributions to college students, student affairs activities, the SAHE Department, and the broader higher education community.

Nancy Newkerk served as dean of women at IUP (then Indiana State Teachers College) from 1957 to 1967 and as associate dean of admissions at IUP from 1978 until her retirement in 1994. She was awarded the IUP President's Medal of Distinction in 2009.

Outstanding Alumni Achievements



Dr. Sophie Penney (SPS '80) visited IUP's campus on Thursday, October 11th. The College of Education and Communications honored Dr. Penney as the 2018 Alumni Scholar. Prior to the awards ceremony and reception, Dr. Penney spent the morning presenting to our SAHE students, faculty, and IUP staff about fundraising in student affairs. Her presentation was titled, "Raising 4, 6, and 8 Figure Gifts." Dr. Penney spoke about the five I's of fundraising, which are "Identify, Inform, Involve, Invest, and Impact." She had participants partner up and evaluate a few scenarios provided. Then, she held a discussion on those scenarios and what could be learned as emerging professionals. Participants thoroughly enjoyed her presentation and our first year students said that they appreciated the consideration of student affairs fundraising as a career. Additionally, students were eager to take the Asking Style Inventory (found at https://askingmatters.com/find-your-style/).

Dr. Penney is the Senior Program Coordinator and Lecturer for Penn State's all-online Certificate Program in Fundraising Leadership. She is also the founder and President of consulting firm i5 Fundraising (i5fundraising.com). Dr. Sophie Penney is the lead co-editor of a new book to be released by NASPA in spring 2019, Raising the Bar: Student Affairs Fundraising. The book is a follow-up to Dollars for Dreams: Student Affairs Staff as Fundraisers, which she co-authored and NASPA published in 2001. Raising the Bar covers an array of topics including: forms of fundraising, best practices, and ethical and legal issues (she specifically authored the ethics and legal issues chapter). Co-editors are Barbara Rose of New Generations Fundraising and Glenn Gittings of University of Louisville.

Justin Brown (SAHE '13) visited IUP on Sunday, November 4th and Monday, November 5th. The College of Education and Communications recognized Justin as their 2018 Young Alumni Achievement Award winner. In addition to receiving his award, Justin spent time presenting to students, faculty, staff and SAHE alumni. 

United Kingdom vs. United States

We started off the study tour in Edinburgh, Scotland where we visited the University of Edinburgh and the University of Strathclyde. We then travelled to Glasgow, Scotland to visit the University of Glasgow. From there, we stopped at the Newbattle Abbey College and the Wisconsin in Scotland program in Dalkeith, Scotland before crossing over into England. Once in England, we visited St. Cloud State University at Alnwick Castle. A part of Alnwick Castle has been transformed into a residence hall and we had the pleasure of staying there for a few nights. Then, we visited York St. John University in York, England. I had learned so much from each institution, but by far my favorite site visit was to the University of Oxford. We ate dinner with students at Exeter College and had the chance to pick their brains about Oxford's unique format and traditional ways. We finished the

tour in London with visits to the University of East London, AMOSSHE, and the National Union of Students.

Most days of the trip were spent in meetings and consultations at the schools where various student affairs departments would present to us about their mission and functions. Our professor, Dr. Ellen Broido, encouraged us to ask questions and delve past the "what" and into the "why". She challenged us to look at student affairs from a different viewpoint and examine the different ways that we can achieve outcomes, depending on the social context. We would end every day with a reflection meeting where we would talk through and process what we had learned that day and brainstorm ideas of how we can carry this knowledge into our work as student affairs professionals. We also had a few days off between site visits to travel and explore the cities that we were visiting. My birthday happened to fall on one of our days off, so I spent my birthday this year traveling around to Bath, Stonehenge and the city of Oxford.

There are many notable differences between student affairs in the UK versus the US. For example, in the US, we have residence halls which foster student engagement and community through programming. In the UK, most students live off campus and even if they do live on campus, most universities do not have residence life departments to plan programs. Therefore, their relationship with the university is very different. Additionally, most US institutions offer general education courses that students are required to take before graduating. In the UK, students apply to a specific major and they typically spend 3 years gaining specialized skills and knowledge within that major. Therefore, students rarely change majors because it is so difficult to. Higher education in the UK is less concerned with holistic development and is more focused on vocational training. Also,

student government organizations are more organized in the UK than in the US and students will take a year off of school to be on the governing board of their student union. Finally, student affairs itself is not viewed as a profession in the UK, and therefore, they do not have masters or doctoral programs in student affairs.

It was an exhausting and overwhelming few weeks, but I came back with a new group of friends and colleagues in Ohio and a broadened perspective on this field that I am about to enter into in a few months.
