Distinguished Alumni Award Winner

Dr. Becky L. Verzinski, Class of 1994

The SAHE Department is pleased to announce **Dr. Becky L. Verzinski** as the recipient of the **Distinguished Alumni Award for 2008.** Becky is a 1994 graduate of SAHE who went on to earn her doctorate at Morgan State University. She is currently working at Towson University (MD) in the Department of Housing & Residence Life as an Assistant Director. She has also worked at SUNY Stony Brook (NY). Becky's accomplishments are not limited to her fine work at Towson



University and Stony Brook where, at both institutions, she has been recognized for her excellence in promoting community and student learning as well as embracing diversity and multicultural programming. Becky's career has also been highlighted by many service and leadership activities, most notably as a faculty member in the mid-Atlantic Regional Entry-Level Institute, conference co-chair for MACUHO, and MCPA conference co-chair.

The award selection committee (comprised of faculty, students, and alumni) reviewed nomination materials from five fine individuals, all of whom have exceptional accomplishments in and contributions to the student affairs profession. The selection committee noted Becky's "significant professional involvement and recognition". One committee member's comment summed up Becky's nomination in this way: "In a very tight crop of nominees, this individual's commitment to diversity, life long learning, and multifaceted collection of presentations at all levels, I believe, qualifies her for this award."

The SAHE Distinguished Alumni Award was created to acknowledge an alumnus of the SAHE department whose experiences and accomplishments as a student affairs professional significantly reflect the standards and values of the SPS program/SAHE department. Previous recipients include Bob Gatti ('78) of Otterbein College (OH) and Peter C. Groenendyk ('94) of the University of Memphis (TN).

The SAHE Department recognized Becky at the 2008 ACPA Convention (Atlanta, GA) during our annual "IUP Alumni & Friends Reception" on Monday, March 31.

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Farewell Thoughts

By the time you read this, the students' countdown to graduation, and mine to retirement, will be nearly completed. That reality is simultaneously exciting and frightening, sweet and bitter. Our graduates are talking about how quickly their two years went by – and I'm thinking about how rapidly nearly four decades disappeared.

I began my professional career teaching mathematics at Fox Chapel High School in Pittsburgh, and end it now after 36 years in student affairs and/or SAHE at IUP. While many things have changed over those years, many have not. I still enjoy mathematics (to the chagrin of my students and to the puzzlement of my faculty colleagues); I'm still using the same Cross Pen set that Don McPherson gave me in 1969; I'm still asked, "Why didn't you use that voice for a career in radio?"; and I'm still energized through working with the fine students and colleagues I've found at IUP and through associational activities.

Despite so many years at IUP, it is interesting for me to note that my memories of them are almost exclusively positive. While undoubtedly there were negative aspects of specific problem situations over the years, those memories are dim. Instead, I'm touched by thoughts of bright young hall counselors in the 1970's (later RA's and now CA's), some of whom maintain contact with me to this day. Similarly, I have very fond memories of fine students with whom I worked in EOP, of student leaders from the Activities Board (The Entertainment Network) and Concert Committees, Student Government, IFC/Panhel/PanHellenic, the Black Emphasis Committee and the hockey teams and fraternities I have advised.

In addition to students, I feel quite privileged to have enjoyed wonderful relationships with many talented student affairs, SAHE and other IUP colleagues – from my earliest days working directly with Ron Thomas, Don McPherson, Jack Frank, Sherry Kuckuck, Jim Laughlin, and, of course, S. Trevor Hadley; with Al Novels & Carolyn Wilkie in EOP; with my SA&O 'dream team' of the 80's (Terry Appolonia, Frank DeStefano & Howard Wray – all SAHE alums); to the truly fine faculty and administrative colleagues I have enjoyed campus-wide, but especially in SAHE – Linda Hall, Holley Belch, and John Mueller now and which previously included Dave DeCoster and Ron Thomas. The alumni who recognize these names understand just how fortunate I've been to have such wonderful colleagues throughout my career. They probably also realize why some alumni complained that we spoiled them, thinking that they could find the same fun, nourishing, and professional environments wherever they went.

I have many vivid memories of running the Governor's Quad, housing 1300 students in the '70's, and of all the unique situations that Student Activities & Organizations presented in the '80's. However, a common thread throughout those years and positions, just like now, are memories related to my associations with our SPS/SAHE program. Teaching one SPS course in the 1970's (which happened to include the parent of a current student) was a humbling and challenging endeavor; supervising SPS/SAHE GA's throughout my practitioner days was a consistently positive experience; and teaching in and/or leading the SAHE program since 1991 has been a most demanding and satisfying professional activity. These involvements afforded me the privilege to get to know very fine people whom I watched turn from eager students into quality professionals, and whose careers I've been able to track with pride.

The knowledge that I've personally had some small impact on helping students to become the fine professionals that they are, and the mutual respect and friendship which I have enjoyed with you all over these many years is indeed satisfying and fulfilling for me. One comment that various SPS/SAHE students have made to me over the years continues to bring me joy – that being, I not only taught them about student affairs, but I also modeled for them the type of professional they hoped to become. What could be more affirming?

As my career ends and I look toward more time for family, travel, golf, and leisure, I will continue to be nourished by the wonderful relationships that I have enjoyed with colleagues and students. I leave knowing that I've always given my best efforts and have tried to value and respect each and every human being with whom I've been in contact. I also leave believing that SAHE is in fine shape, positioned with excellent faculty to continue our honorable work, with fine students for whom \$IM in assistantship support exists annually, and a national reputation that continues to be shaped positively by the outstanding work performed by SAHE alumni. That's pretty good stuff!

Thank you for all of your support and friendship throughout these many years. I'll probably not be on the SAHE listserv anymore, but I'd still appreciate hearing from SPS/SAHE friends and colleagues. Faculty Search Successfully Completed



The Department of Student Affairs in Higher Education is extremely pleased to announce that we have successfully completed our search for the faculty position which began last fall. The position of Associate Professor has been offered to and accepted by **Dr. John Wesley Lowery** of Oklahoma State University.

Dr. John Wesley Lowery is Associate Professor in the School of Educational Studies at the Oklahoma State University and coordinates the college student affairs program and higher education programs. He previously served on the faculty at the University of South Carolina where he also coordinated the Higher Education and Student Affairs Program. He earned his doctorate at Bowling Green State University in Higher Education Administration. While at BGSU, Dr. Lowery served in a variety of roles including Editorial Assistant for About Campus and Visiting Instructor for BGSU's College Student Personnel Program. Before beginning his doctoral work in 1996, he was Director of Residence Life at Adrian College in Michigan and University Judicial Administrator at Washington University in St. Louis.

Dr. Lowery has been very active in professional associations. He served as ASJA's CAS Director for five years. He served as Board of Directors for both NASPA (2002-2004) and ASJA (1996-1999). He has previously chaired the ASJA's Legislative Issues and Resolutions Committees as well as co-chairing the Interassociation Task Force on the National Baseline Study on Campus Sexual Assault. Dr. Lowery also previously served on the Core Council on Outreach and Advocacy for the American College Personnel Association (ACPA) and on the directorate body of Commission 15: Campus Judicial Affairs and Legal Issues of ACPA.

Dr. Lowery has a Masters degree in student personnel services from the University of South Carolina and his undergraduate degree in religious studies is from the University of Virginia. He is a frequent speaker and author on topics related to student affairs and higher education, particularly legislative issues and student judicial affairs. In recent years, Dr. Lowery has presented at numerous national and regional conferences including, the American College Personnel Association Convention, the Association for Student Judicial Affairs Conference, Donald D. Gehring Academy for Student Conduct Administration, the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators Conference, NASPA/ Stetson Student Affairs Law & Policy Conference, the Stetson University Law and Higher Education Conference, and the University of Vermont's Legal Issues in Higher Education Conference.

Dr. Lowery currently serves on the Board of Contributors for *About Campus*. In 2005, he co-edited a special issue of the *NASPA Journal* on legal issues and judicial affairs. In addition, Dr. Lowery has served as a Department Editor for *About Campus*, on the Editorial Board of the *NASPA Journal*, as a reviewer for the *College Student Affairs Journal*, and as Associate Editor of *Synthesis: Law and Policy in Higher Education*. He is the author of numerous articles and book chapters.

Over his career, Dr. Lowery has been honored by several professional organizations. In 2007, he was recognized by the Higher Education Administration doctoral program at Bowling Green State University as the alumnus of year in "recognition of outstanding contributions to the profession through teaching, research, and service." At the 2007 Association for Student Judicial Affairs Conference, he received the D. Parker Young Award for "outstanding ongoing scholarly research contributions to the fields of higher education and student judicial affairs." At the American College Personnel Association's 2005 meeting, he received the Tracy R. Teele Memorial Award from the Commission on Campus Judicial Affairs and Legal Issues for "outstanding contributions to the area of judicial affairs and legal issues." The University of South Carolina Student Personnel Association recognized his contributions in the classroom awarding him the Faculty Member of the Year Award in 2006, an award which he had previously won in 2004 and 2001.

Dr. Lowery will start in August of 2008. Students, faculty, and alumni are excited to work with him in writing the next chapter in SAHE's history!



SPA/SAHE Alum Wins First-Ever Scholar Award!



The Department of Student Affairs in Higher Education is extremely proud to announce that Dr. Raechele L. Pope ('81) is one of two recipients of IUP's College of Education and Educational Technology Alumni Scholar award. This year is the first year this award has been presented to alumnus of the college.

Raechele, a 1996 recipient of IUP's "Distinguished Alumni" award, is a 1979 graduate of the Political Science department and a 1981 graduate of the Student Personnel Services program (now SAHE). Since leaving IUP she gained practitioner experience at Illinois State University, the University of Iowa, and the University of Massachusetts (where she earned her doctorate). From UMass, she moved into her first faculty position at Teachers College (Columbia University), fol-

lowed by her current faculty role at the University at Buffalo.

Throughout her twenty-seven year career, Raechele Pope has become one of the most passionate, articulate and visible champions of multiculturalism in higher education. Early in her career, shortly after leaving IUP, Raechele was on the national scene discussing these issues at conventions and at invited speaking engagements and consultations. Raechele's scholarly work now includes over twenty-five publications including a book and numerous book chapters, refereed articles, and book reviews as well as dozens of national presentations, speeches, and consultations. Her reputation as a scholar has lead to service on a variety of editorial boards, think tanks, task groups, and panels with some of our profession's most significant scholars such as Alexander Astin, Marcia Baxter-Magolda, George Kuh, Nancy Evans, Vasti Torres, and Susan Komives. The impact of Raechele Pope's work on the student affairs profession is also evident in numerous awards she has received.

The College of Education and Educational Technology can take great pride in producing one of the finest scholars in the student affairs profession. The SAHE faculty, in their letter of nomination, affirmed that "presenting Dr. Raechele L. Pope with the Alumni Scholar Award not only acknowledges her substantial impact on the profession but also adds to the prestige of the award itself." Congratulations, Raechele!


