




SAHE travels to the UK...

Chair's Corner

Greetings from SAHE! We are well into the fall semester and both cohorts are working hard to develop as professionals in our field. Thirty-one students comprised our 37th graduating class in May and shortly thereafter, our newly enrolled cohort brought together 35 students from all over the country. Dr. John Wesley Lowery joined us in August and has already added a wonderful new dimension to our program. We are a stable and strong graduate program with excellent students, supportive alumni, and committed faculty. This year is off to a great start!

As the new Chair, I feel challenged and pleased with my new role. I am getting used to lots of meetings again and find that each day I am learning something valuable. It has been gratifying to add this "administrative" component to my role as I work with students, faculty, and others across the college

and university. I have truly appreciated the support and important contributions of the three fine faculty in our department. They are a source of energy for me, enthusiasm for our program, and as you know, they all bring exceptional experience, credentials, scholarship, and national visibility to SAHE.

The campus is still undergoing tremendous new construction and major renovation projects—traffic is rerouted almost daily and buildings are being completed in record pace. There is a beautiful new residential area where Mack, Stewart, Turnbull, Wahr and Langham halls once stood—mostly with suite configurations and landscaped beautifully. Esch, Wallace, Pechan Health Center, and Campus Towers were leveled and new structures replacing those will be completed by September. Fisher Auditorium is now connected to Waller Hall, creating the new and wonderful IUP Performing Arts Center. The campus is very different! The SAHE Department is still located in Stouffer Hall and when you are in the area, we hope that you will let us know and stop by for a visit and tour.

From an enrollment perspective, SAHE is on-target with 61 students enrolled. Our students are from 14 states, and represent 41 different undergraduate institutions. We're also pleased to report that 27 hold assistantships at IUP, 26 at other colleges in our region and 3 are employed full time. Carnegie Mellon and Clarion Universities remain our largest external placement sites with 8 and 6 students respectively. We're pleased to welcome the University of Pittsburgh and California University of Pennsylvania as new sites and assistantship partners with SAHE.

We are recruiting for the next SAHE cohort and truly appreciate your referrals. Most of our students report that they heard of SAHE through an alum and often that professional has served as a mentor or supervisor. You are essential to our success! I have spent a great deal of time this semester preparing to teach several new

classes, getting to know the students in the program, and learning more about the SAHE program's activities like E-portfolios and Comprehensive Exams. I will also be doing some professional travel for conferences including a keynote address at PCPA and presentations at the NACA Mid American Regional Conference in Peoria, IL and the NASPA/Stetson Student Affairs Law and Policy Conference in Las Vegas. In the spring, I will be presenting at the ASJA Conference in Florida, the Linda B. Floyd & SCCPA Joint Campus Safety Conference in Myrtle Beach, and the NASPA Conference in Seattle. I am also working with several higher education doctoral students at Oklahoma State University to critically examine the representations of fraternity and sorority life in horror films. As you can tell, my research interests are varied and allow me to work with a variety of colleagues across the country, something I highly value as a professional.

I am honored to be part of such a dynamic faculty at IUP and to work with the SAHE program that is widely respected and produces talented alumni who work in a variety of capacities in and outside of higher education across the country and internationally.
