


Chair's Corner

This past June, I spent three weeks traveling around this magnificent country from Beijing to Inner Mongolia to Shanghai to Xian to Hong Kong. All of this was part of a study tour that examined the delivery of higher education in China, including admissions, curriculum, and student services. The tour included institutional visits to Tsinghua University, Peking University, Shanghai Jiaotong University, and Xian Jiaotong University. In addition to the campuses, we visited a number of economic, cultural, and historic landmarks, including the Forbidden City, National Olympic Stadium, the Great Wall, the Shanghai Futures Exchange, and the Terracotta Warriors. 

SAHE Remembers David DeCoster

David DeCoster died after an extended illness in Lady Lake, Florida, on October 28, 2013.

DeCoster served as vice president for Student Affairs at IUP from 1985 –1994 and then as professor in the Department of Student Affairs in Higher Education until his retirement in 1999.

DeCoster was a respected and committed educator and administrator who established a renowned national reputation resulting from his scholarly contributions, his work in professional associations, and numerous consultantships. Prior to his tenure at IUP, DeCoster held administrative positions at the University of Georgia, University of Florida, Indiana University at Bloomington, and the University of Nebraska.

Affectionately known as "Dave" or "DAD" (from his initials), he was a wonderful mentor and an inspiration to young and seasoned professionals within higher education, especially within the field of student affairs.



Exploring Higher Education in the United Kingdom

This past year, we (Danie, Dayna, Kelly and Meghan) traveled to the United Kingdom as part of a Study Tour sponsored by Bowling Green State University. The tour gave us the opportunity to visit many places in England and Scotland, including institutions of higher education and cultural sites. This was an interesting tour for our small group because some of us have never traveled out-

side of the country, while others have seen many different countries.

The tour informed our student affairs practices in many ways. We were able to network with students

from various institutions, such as the University of Michigan, University of South Carolina, Iowa State University and Northeastern University. This gave us the opportunity to learn what other students were learning and compare programs. Further, we gained a better understanding of the many differences between American higher education and higher education in the United Kingdom.

Even though their office structures are vastly different, these professionals still focus on the same things that we do.

If anything, the four of us learned how similar higher education is across the pond. We focus on the same things and have the same goal in mind: preparing our students for life after college.
