

## 2016 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient Courtney Baum

Indiana University of Pennsylvania's Department of Student Affairs in Higher Education (SAHE) is pleased to announce **Courtney Baum** as the recipient of the Ronald Lunardini Distinguished Alumni Award for 2016. Baum is a 2000 graduate of SAHE and is currently the Director of Saint Vincent College's Career Center as well as an adjunct faculty member in the college's Department of Education. Prior to Saint Vincent, Courtney held career services positions at Carnegie Mellon University in the Heinz College and in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Courtney's contributions to the profession are highlighted by active service at her respective institutions and active

participation in career development professional associations such as the National Career Development Association (NCDA) and the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE). She presents regularly on topics related to career services and serves as a mentor to SAHE students. Courtney has served on various committees supporting equity and inclusion, and serves as the Westmoreland County Young Professionals Chairperson for the Greater Latrobe Laurel Valley Area Chamber of Commerce.

Numerous letters of support from professional colleagues and students were submitted in support of her nomination. A current student commented on "the life-changing impact she has had and will continue to have on every student she encounters" and a colleague noted her "enthusiasm, organizational skills, and attention to detail is matched by an incredible level of diligence." Additionally, an alumnus commented, "She is a model alumna: giving back to her alma mater and contributing to the student affairs profession by spending her time and energy helping to prepare new professionals."

The award selection committee (comprised of faculty, students, and alumni) in their review of the nomination materials for Courtney, unanimously affirmed that she meets and exceeds the award criteria, particularly in the areas of promoting student success, collaborating with colleagues, embracing lifelong learning, and contributing to the profession.

The award will be presented to Courtney at the annual SAHE banquet on May 5, 2016.

This has been a busy spring semester. We had a very strong group of applicants to the program, many of whom were sent to us by our alumni. Last month, almost 50 prospective students visited campus for Visitation. This year, we held our annual reception at NASPA and I appreciated all of the SAHE alumni who stopped by. We were also well represented at ACPA by John Mueller and a number of current students. I was excited to see so many of our recent graduates presenting at NASPA and ACPA this year.

Outside of SAHE, I've been enjoying weekly yoga classes and singing with the Indiana Community Choir. Both of these activities continue to stretch me—physically, intellectually, and musically. And in between it all, I satisfy my obsession with politics by closely following the presidential campaigns online and on cable news. I'm already looking forward to what the fall will bring. In the meantime, here's to warmer weather, longer days, budding trees, and countdowns to new adventures!

Despite the fact that I'm still wearing my winter coat, I know that summer is on the horizon and I look forward to getting away and getting lots done! I hope that you've had a productive winter and spring and that good things are on the horizon for you!

## Video Games and Student Affairs: An Alumna's Unique Position By: Jennifer Hinton (2000)


When I graduated from the SAHE program in 2000, I KNEW only two things to be true: that I would be at Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) for only 2-3 years in an entry level residence life position before moving up and out into a mid-level manager position and that I when I retired, I would retire having spent my entire career working in residence life, a functional area that I was deeply passionate about.

Today, 16 years later, I am happy to say that I was wrong on both accounts, and I couldn't be happier! The career and role(s) that I have now could not have been realized back then; for numerous reasons, including the fact that the positions did not exist at RIT when I started. Both my current role(s) as well as my prior were designed for me and I have enjoyed both the great privilege and responsibility of defining these roles. These positions have grown out of and have evolved from changes in our culture at RIT on every level, beginning with the creation of a degree program in Game Design and Development (which was just ranked #3 in the United States and Canada by the Princeton Review).

So what are these roles and what do I do? Today, I am the Assistant Director of the RIT Center for Media, Arts, Games, Interaction and Creativity, also known as MAGIC, a university-wide research center. In addition, MAGIC is also home to MAGIC Spell Studios, a commercial, for-profit game studio that produces and publishes student and faculty work in the ever-changing and expanding field of digital media. Our studio is the first of its kind on a university campus and was established in 2013 at the directive of our President. For the Studio I serve as the Chief Communications Officer.

At MAGIC, we believe that you learn by making and it is our mission to provide students with the unique and challenging learning opportunity to develop, ship and publish a game that that they (or in some cases we, together) have created. In many ways, we are our own start-up company and we are teaching and leading by example this process. Shipping a game is both exhausting and exhilarating! The student (and professional) learning and development associated with this process is unlike anything that I have ever been a part of, and is an ideal experience, that paired with their coursework and other "college experiences" prepares students well for the difficult, but rewarding career in the games industry-and beyond.

## A Scary Leap Into the Unknown: Transitioning from Campus Staff to Full-Time Campus Speaker By: Jamie Piperato SAHE (2014)

In 2015, I attended South Carolina's NAACP College and Youth Division Conference as an advisor of Coastal Carolina University's chapter. During one of the sessions, a man stood before the students and said, "Stop making someone else's dream come true. Go out there and make your own dreams a reality." This message was not intended for me (for multiple reasons); however, it couldn't have come at a better time in my life.

Shortly after the conference, I made one of the scariest decisions of my career. I made the decision to leave my fulltime position as Assistant Director of Multicultural Student Services at Coastal Carolina University to pursue opening up my own higher education consulting and speaking business (Jamie Piperato, LLC). The short and long of it is that I determined it was time to make my dream a reality. I was tired of working all day and night (literally...I know you all know what I'm talking about) to make someone else's dream come true. Now, I still might work all day and night but it's with the autonomy to impact our profession in a slightly different and more creative way.

My business focuses on providing professional development workshops for faculty, staff, and students on equity and inclusion as well as leadership development (for more information, please visit jamiepiperato.com). While working in the field, I was noticing disparities in the education and skills around working with marginalized students on campus. My business serves as a creative way to address these disparities on a national level. I provide professional development workshops that equip folks with the language and skills to complete this work effectively. I also create free content (via blogs, webinars, podcasts, and resource packets) that challenges folks to utilize a social justice lens in their work.

This journey has been one unbelievable ride that has challenged me in new and exciting ways. With zero business background, I have had to push myself to learn about a field I knew nothing about, but as a result I believe it has made me a better student affairs professional. To say the least, it has certainly required me to master the skills of marketing, graphic design, budgeting, and a slue of other skills that are all applicable to the higher education profession.



So, here I am. I survived my first full year as a self-employed student affairs consultant and speaker. I'm not sure what the path ahead of me looks like yet. All I know is that I love what I am doing and for now I am going to continue to shape our profession in my own creative way. 


