2017 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient



We are excited to announce Jennifer DuBrava Hinton as the recipient of the Ronald Lunardini Distinguished Alumni Award for 2017!

Jennifer is a 2000 graduate of SAHE and is currently the Assistant Director of Rochester Institute of Technology's Center for Media, Arts, Games, Interaction and Creativity (MAGIC), as well as Chief Communications Officer for MAGIC Spell Studios. Prior to these roles at RIT, she served as Assistant Director of Student Experience, Director of Alumni Relations, Senior Academic Advisor, Interim Assistant Director and Program Coordinator for New Student Orientation, and Residence Director. In 1999, Jennifer was the first to receive SAHE's Nancy Newkerk Scholarship, in honor of her professional promise for a career in higher education.

Numerous letters of support from professional colleagues and students were submitted in support of her nomination. A current student commented, "I have seen many individuals in higher education who 'check out' after work is over, and it amazes me that Jennifer not only supports our University's community, but that she's actually passionate about us inside and outside of the classroom walls." A colleague wrote, "Her ability to manage multiple priorities, care deeply for others, and develop and support opportunities for students and staff are qualities I have seen in very few professionals with the field of higher education."

The award selection committee (comprised of SAHE faculty, students, and alumni) in their review of the nomination materials for Jennifer, unanimously affirmed that she meets and exceeds the award criteria, particularly in the areas of promoting student success, collaborating with colleagues, embracing lifelong learning, and contributing to the profession.

The award will be presented to Jennifer at the annual SAHE Kick-Off in August 2017. The Distinguished Alumni Award began in 2006 and was created to acknowledge an alumnus of the SAHE department whose experiences and accomplishments as a student affairs professional significantly reflect the standards and values of the SPS program/SAHE department. In 2008, in recognition of Ron Lunardini's 37 years of service to IUP (18 as an SAHE faculty member), the award title was changed to honor him.

Greetings from SAHE!

I hope that each of you is having a great semester and enjoying the arrival of spring. We had a particularly mild winter, but the arrival of spring in western Pennsylvania is still welcome. With spring comes blooming flowers and the greening of the Oak Grove after the dull colors of winter.

This has been a busy spring semester. We had a very strong group of applicants to the program, many of whom were sent to us by our alumni. Last month, almost 50 prospective students visited campus for Visitation. We are now in the process of making assistantship offers and a number of students have already committed to attending SAHE next year.

We are continuing to refine the portfolio requirement for second year students. We have updated the portfolio to incorporate the updated ACPA/NASPA Professional Competency Areas for Student Affairs Educators (2015) and the new ACPA/NASPA Professional Competencies Rubrics (2016). This year much of

the work of the portfolio process has been integrated into SAHE 740: Contemporary Issues in Higher Education, but students still work with their advisors on several elements.

With the spring semester also comes the conference season and I had the opportunity to talk with a number of SAHE alumni at the ASCA conference in Florida and NASPA in San Antonio, Texas. SAHE was very well represented at NASPA. A number of our current second year students attended the conference and participated in TPE and shared their great experiences. This year, we held our annual reception at ACPA and I was glad to hear that so many SAHE alumni stopped by. We were well represented at ACPA in Columbus by Mimi Benjamin, John Mueller, and a number of current students. I was even there briefly myself to present the ACPA Legislative Update.

Attending *The Forum of Education Abroad* annual conference in Seattle, WA between March 29-31, 2017, provided an opportunity for new and seasoned professionals to come together and share ideas of best practices. The focus of this conference is to discuss the standards of good practices established by the Forum, and practical methods to implement them within your role. This non-profit organization provides an opportunity for individual professionals to become certified in the standards or the institution can achieve Quality Improvement Program certification (QUIP).



At this conference, I was able to reconnect with undergraduate friends and network with other professionals from all over the world. There were more than 1,300 attendees at this conference representing professionals on a college campus, third party providers, international universities, faculty members, graduate and undergraduate students, and other professionals that support students throughout their study abroad experience.

Some sessions I attended were "Practical Risk Management Abroad", "Mental Health Strategies for Study Abroad", "Complying with Title IX Abroad", "Examining the Parent Roles to Enhance Student Development on the Study Abroad Continuum", and many more.

This conference gave me further insight on the individual certification process, which will help me be able to initiate standards of best practice in my current position and beyond. I was able to expand my network of passionate professionals within the field, while actively pursuing a career in Education Abroad. The next annual conference will take place in Boston, MA between March 21 and 23, 2018.

Global Perspectives

In May 2016, I participated in a study tour to the United Kingdom hosted by the Higher Education and Student Affairs (HESA) program at Bowling Green State University (BGSU). My small group consisted of graduate students (the majority from BGSU) and one doctoral student from Indiana University. The program was coordinated by Dr. Ellen Broido and her graduate assistant, Aryn Lipnicki.

Our tour began in Edinburgh, the capital city of Scotland. While in Scotland we visited the University of Edinburgh and the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow. We then headed south to England. In England, we visited the York St. John University, the University of Oxford, the University of Reading, and the University of East London. In addition to visiting those institutions, we met with representatives from the University of Wisconsin-River Falls' program in Dalkeith, Scotland, and St. Cloud State University's program in Alnwick, England. We also met with leaders from the National Union of Students (NSU) and other organizations that can be likened to NASPA and ACPA. At each institution, we had the privilege of listening to and engaging in presentations with professional staff, who were more than eager to share their insights and knowledge with us. Dr. Broido arranged for us to hear from professionals in a wide variety of functional areas, including disability support, mental health services, international education, athletics, and residence life.


In our free time, we immersed ourselves in the local culture. Cultural excursions included a day trip to Stone-

henge and Bath, and many of us participated in guided tours around the different cities to hear the locals' perspectives on the history and culture.

This study tour allowed me to increase my global perspective on higher education. We focused primarily on experiencing a culture different from our own and gaining an understanding of the higher education system outside of the United States. The most significant difference that I discovered was that the field of student affairs does not exist in England and Scotland as it does in the United States. It is referred to as "student services", and there are no student affairs related graduate programs. Knowledge of student development theory among professionals is relatively scarce.

However, there are some notable similarities. Professional staff in England and Scotland share the same values we do. We both want to enrich the student experience, facilitate student growth and development, improve programs and practice, collaborate and share ideas, and increase access to students of all backgrounds, the latter of which they refer to as "widening participation".

Participating in this study tour was an inspiring, eyeopening experience. I encourage all future SAHE students to consider participating in a study tour. I am thankful for the partnership between IUP SAHE and BGSU, for without them, I would have never been able to explore differing student affairs views and practices abroad.

Lauren Blum ('12) married Kevin Doyle in June of 2016.


Brittany Benton Lee ('03) married Matthew Lee in 2015 and welcomed their son, Benton Garrett in December 2016.

In June 2016, the James C. Grimm National Housing Training Institute (NHTI) brought four IUP SAHE alum together in sunny Tampa, Florida. NHTI is an intensive professional development opportunity offered by the Association of College and University Housing Officers-International (ACUHO-I) and is intended for housing and residence life professionals with 3-7 years of experience (ACUHO-I, 2017). Participants are assigned to one of two host sites (Michigan State University or University of South Florida) for a weeklong experience that includes working closely with a diverse group of colleagues and hearing from leading professionals in our field on how to develop within ACUHO-I's competency areas to prepare for the next professional position. Mentorship, camaraderie, and endless learning opportunities abounded both during and after NHTI.

RC Stabile ('12) and Kristin Brewer ('13) were both participants in the experience. Stabile, a current Area Coordinator at Vanderbilt University in Nashville Tennessee, had applied after a positive experience at SEAHO's Regional Entry Level Institute a year prior. Stabile wanted to attend in order to grow his knowledge around specific topical areas such as Housing Assignments and Facilities services. Stabile was surprised to see how much learning occurred not just from faculty, but from his peer cohort members as well. Brewer, currently an Area Coordinator at Baldwin Wallace University, was encouraged by a close mentor, a colleague, and her supervisor to apply. For Brewer, NHTI was exactly what she was looking for to challenge herself beyond her current skill set, help inform her current position, and continue to develop professional support network.

Dr. Virginia Koch ('86) served as an NHTI faculty member, specializing in the Assessment competency. Dr. Koch currently serves as the Director of Residence Life at Auburn University. The final IUP SAHE alum, Bonnie Prunty ('87) served as the chair of the coordinating committee responsible for the entire NHTI experience. Prunty is the Director of Residential Life and Judicial Affairs at Ithaca College, and has had great professional development opportunities serving in a number of leadership roles for ACUHO-I.

Overall, NHTI was an incredible experience made even richer by the IUP SAHE connection. The four of us may have even been the largest contingency from one graduate program that was present that year! We were proud to represent IUP SAHE and are grateful for Koch and Prunty for role modeling the importance of being involved and giving back to our amazing profession. Bonnie Prunty shared that she "has made her entire career at one institution and she attributes her involvement with ACUHO-I, and programs like NHTI, with her ability to develop a strong professional network and stay current in our field."




